

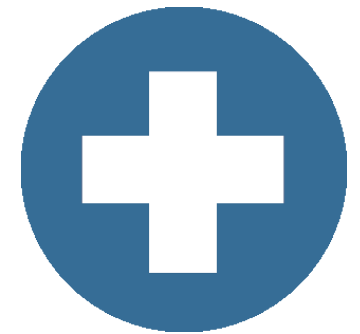
Sweden's response to COVID-19

Sweden's work to combat the Corona virus

- **A universal welfare state that is accessible to all**
- **Social protection for all, accessible welfare services** including **parental leave**
- **Strong mutual trust** between public authorities and citizens
- **Whole-of-Government approach**
- Measures aim to **save lives and slow down the outbreak**
- Strengthen the Swedish **health care system to cope** with COVID-19

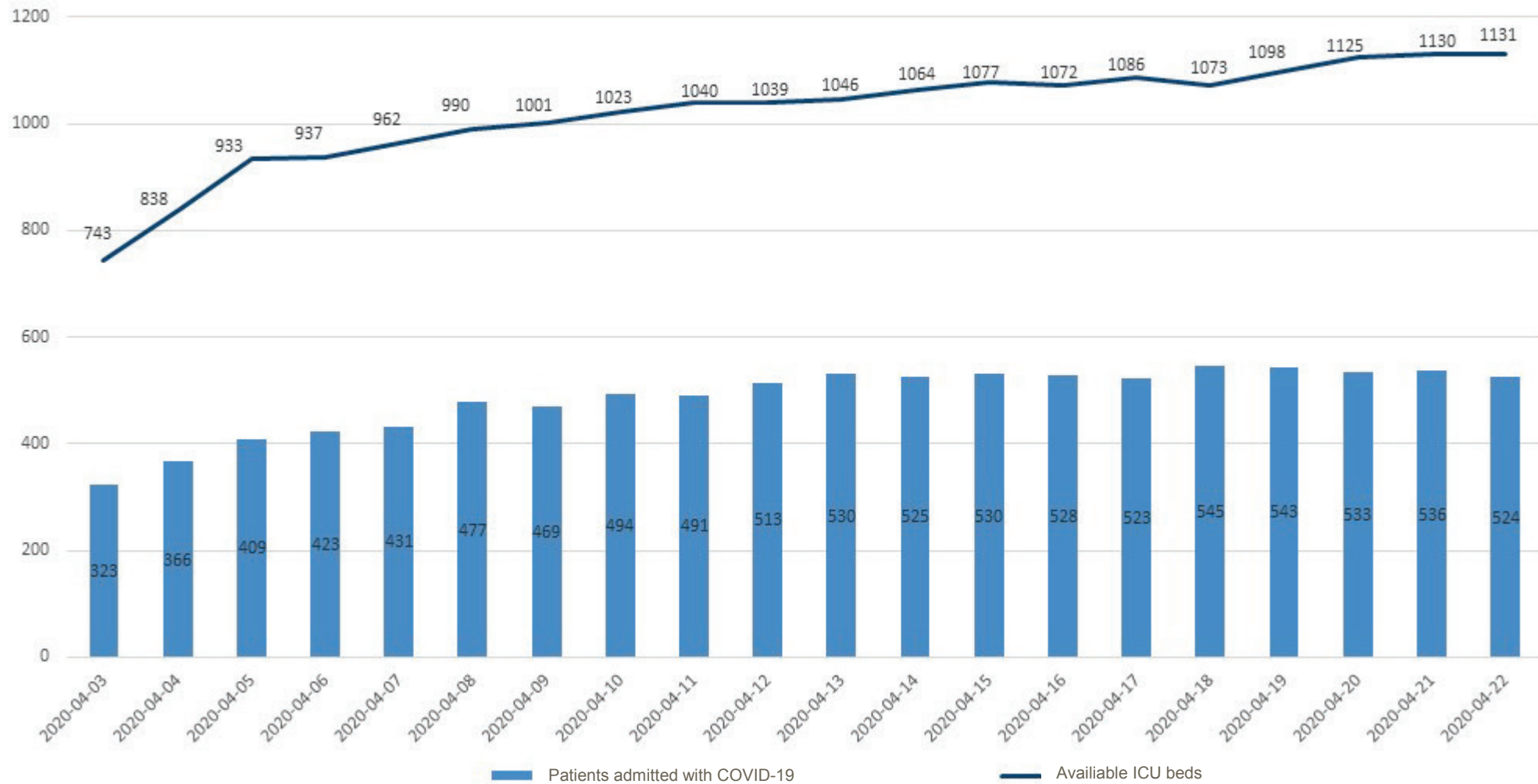


Five aspects of our approach

1. Government in charge – but expert agencies and international bodies play a key role
2. Protecting the elderly and risk groups is a top priority
3. Social distancing and incentives to stay at home
4. Aim for endurable strategies and public trust
5. Flexible adjustment to developments on the ground
