


Universal Health and Preparedness Review (UHPR)

Purpose of the UHPR

- Promote global solidarity, peer-learning, pooling of best practices and jointly support capacity building
- Track progress through a periodic review which will lead to greater shared accountability and transparency among Member States
- Promote predictable and sustainable resources by bringing a greater focus on where donors and partners can provide technical and financial support in line with critical gaps
- Keep health emergency preparedness high on national, regional and global political agendas to break the cycle of 'panic and neglect'
- Enhance multisectoral action and whole of society approach




UHPR Process: 5 steps

National Process: Relevant Reviews to consider

UHPR

- Expert-led evaluation
- Multisectoral self-assessment by technical experts at the national level that is reviewed by global technical experts
- Focuses on the engagement of technical experts up to the level of the Minister of Health
- Data collected using 19 technical areas
- Data does not currently look at health systems capacities and other interdependencies
- The evaluation uses a scoring system and includes technical recommendations in a public mission report developed jointly by national and global technical experts

- Member States-led peer review mechanism
- Multisectoral and whole of-society approach, involving all relevant stakeholders at national and local levels
- Focuses on highest-level political engagement as impetus for raising awareness, reinforcing multisectoral engagement, commitment and investments
- Uses data available submitted by countries. Information from JEE where available will feed into the UHPR process.
- Looks at key capacities not covered by any current (WHO) assessment tools i.e. governance, national systems and financing.




