The preparatory process towards the fourth High-level Meeting of the United Nations General Assembly on the Prevention and Control of NCDs

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Political declaration of the third high-level meeting of UNGA on the prevention and control of NCDs (resolution A/RES/73/2) authorizes the President of the UNGA to convene the fourth high-level meeting on NCDs in 2025.

- UNGA resolution on the scope, purpose and modalities of the HLM4, to be negotiated by Member States with the support of two co-facilitators appointed by the President of the United Nations General Assembly
- Outcome document to be adopted at the HLM4 will be also negotiated by Member States under the auspices of the same two co-facilitators





Fourth UN High-level Meeting on NCDs and mental health Overview

- The preparatory process for the fourth high-level meeting (HLM4) on NCDs is outlined in document A75/10 Add.5 (Annex 11) submitted for and noted by WHA75.
- The process builds on high-level meetings in 2011, 2014 and 2018.
- It includes meetings and consultations co-sponsored by WHO and relevant partners, which may serve as:
 - input into the negotiations among Member States on the "modalities" resolution and the outcome document
 - contribute to the development of recommendations that may be included in the 2024 progress report of the United Nations Secretary-General to the United Nations General Assembly on the prevention and control of NCDs.

ANNEX II

PREPARATORY PROCESS LEADING TO THE FOURTH HIGH-LEVEL MEETING OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY ON THE PREVENTION AND CONTROL OF NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES IN 2025

Mandate

- 1. Paragraph 50 of the policical declaration of the third high-level meeting of the General Assembly on the prevention and control of non-communicable diseases requests "the United Nations Secretary-General in constitution with Member States, and in collaboration with the World Health Organization and relevant funds, programmes and specialized agencies of the United Nations system, to submit to the General Assembly, by the end of 2004, for consideration by Member States, a report on the progress achieved in the implementation of the present political declaration, in preparation for a high-level receiting on a comprehensive review, in 2025, of the progress achieved in the prevention and control of non-communicable diseases and the promotion of misratal hostils and well-being." 1
- The preparatory process leading to the fourth high-level meeting of the General Assembly on the prevention and control of con-communicable diseases was first set out in paragraph 44 of document A74/10 Rev.1, which was noted by Member States at the Seventy-fourth World Health Assembly.
- 3. The purpose of this Annex is to provide an update on that preparatory process

Scope, purpose and modalities

- 4. Premature duaths caused by NCDs can be prevented when countries take legislative and regulatory encausers and implement policies to reusend to the needs of people living with or at risk of cardiovascular diseases, careers, diabetes, chronic respiratory diseases or mental health conditions, including preventive, curative, pullative and specialized care. Some 85% of all premature deaths occurs in lows and middle-income countries. A large proportion of the global population live in low- and middle-income countries where the social, economic and physical environments affined lower levels of protection from the risks of NCDs, such as tobacco use, the humidit was of alcobed, unhealthy detex, physical inactivity and as pollution. In addition, during the COVED-19 paralories, NCDs and mental health services have been the most commonly discapted omnog all coordinal health services.
- 5. Many countries are still lacking the capacity to fallf the commitment, as set out in paragraph. If of United Nations General Assembly resolution 73/2, to provide strategic leadenship for the percention and control of NCDs by promoting greater policy otherwise and coordination through whole-of-parameters and Health in All Policies approaches and by engaging stakeholders an appropriate, coordinated, comprehensive, integrated and bold whole-of-occuty action and response.
- Engagement between governments and non State actors for the prevention and control of NCDs has proven to be challenging in the context of non-State actor compliance with public health policies and regulations, particularly in finding common ground to optimize the complementary expertise and





Global High-Level Technical Meeting on NCDs In Humanitarian Settings

27-29 February 2024, Copenhagen, Denmark

Purpose

To raise global awareness of the need to consider NCDs as part of emergency preparedness and response, and to forge relationships between the NCD, Humanitarian, Refugee and Health Systems communities in advance of the UN High Level Meeting on NCDs in 2025.



Objectives

- 1. Review current NCD related responses in countries during the COVID-19 pandemic and other emergencies and humanitarian crises, across WHO Regions, based on a series of regional consultations held in 2022 and 2023.
- 2. Recommend strategic and integrated approaches to improve technical assistance to countries across preparedness, response, and recovery phases and agree on practical steps to better address NCD and the health of displaced persons in acute and protracted emergencies.
- 3. Inform the report to the UN Secretary General before the UN High Level meeting on NCDs in 2025, drawing on WHO recommendations endorsed during the 75th session of the World Health Assembly.





Global High-Level Technical Meeting on NCDs In Humanitarian Settings

Policy recommendations

- Embed NCD prevention, diagnosis, treatment and palliation in primary care services and in emergency riskmanagement policies and strategies.
- Adapt legislation to ensure that IDPs and refugees have access to the full range of NCD services within the national benefits package.
- Ensure that resourcing for NCD care is maintained during acute and protracted emergencies, through to resilient recovery. This may require blending of domestic, humanitarian and overseas development assistance funding to ensure continuity of services initiated during crises.


Process



NCD global monitoring framework and targets

- In 2013 the WHA adopted the NCD GMF and 9 global targets these ambitious but achievable targets were intended to drive change in prevention and control of NCDs
- The current GMF and targets are until 2025, and the upcoming 4th UNHLM is an opportunity to review progress and look beyond 2025 with an updated GMF and targets
- WHO will facilitate a process for updating and agreeing the post-2025 GMF and targets, ensuring opportunity and reflection to refine, recalibrate and renew a new GMF aligned to emerging NCD challenges
- The process will engage experts, Member States, NSAs, and will align with the processes and preparations for the 4th UNHLM





Expert reference group for GMF updating

An **Expert Reference Group (ERG)** will provide technical guidance and recommendations to WHO for updating the NCD global monitoring framework and targets towards 2050 through 2030. The group will draw upon diverse expertise to provide feedback to ensure latest scientific insights into the updated framework are provided.

Terms of reference:


- 1. Review the current WHO NCD global monitoring framework and targets in the context of the SDGs, GPW indicators, progress indicators and disease and condition specific targets as well as current epidemiological shifts and the 5 by 5 agenda.
- 2. Identify gaps, emerging issues, and areas for improvement based on recent evidence and global health trends.
- 3. Propose updates and revisions to the global NCD monitoring framework and targets to strengthen relevance, feasibility, and impact.
- 4. Integrate the progress indicators into the framework.
- 5. Ensure alignment with international commitments, such as Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and the Implementation Roadmap for the WHO Global Action Plan for the Prevention and Control of NCDs, the 5 by 5 agenda and disease specific targets.




Initial inputs to the web-based consultation
