Chronology of Events Surrounding the 1970 Constitutional Convention

June 30, 1965 Creation of Constitution Study Commission

to study need for revision.

February 1967 Commission recommendations released to

75th General Assembly recommended that the General Assembly place the proposition of a constitutional convention on the November 1968 ballot. SJR 2, calling for a vote on the issue to be held concurrently with the November 5, 1968 general election, was approved by

the General Assembly.

July 24, 1967 Creation of Constitution Study Commission II

to study setting up the convention if the referendum was approved (SB 1376).

February 1968 Governor Kerner creates the Illinois Committee

for Constitutional Convention (ICCC) to garner

support for the convention.

November 5, 1968 Proposition for the calling of a convention

presented to electionate in conjunction with the general elections (of 4.7 million voting, 2.9

million voted aye, 1.1 million voted nay).

May 7, 1969 Enabling legislation based on recommendations

of Constitution Study Commission II approved

(P.A. 76-40).

September 23, 1969 Primary election held to choose candidates for

November 18, 1969 general election of

delegates.

October 1969 Constitution Study Commission III formed to

prepare for the organization of and aid to the

convention.

November 1969 General election held to elect two convention

delegates from each Senate district.

December 8, 1969 Constitutional convention convened.

September 3, 1970 Proposed constitution signed.

December 15, 1970 Special election held for adoption of the

proposed constitution. Constitution approved

by a vote of 1,122,425 to 838,168.
