[REPORT OF ACTION TAKEN IN CLOSED SESSION ON 2 TUESDAY, MAY 2, 2023, ON PAGE 246] 3 4 5 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: WHAT IS -- GOOD MORNING, AND WELCOME TO THE MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC. WE WELCOME YOU TO THE REGULARLY 6 SCHEDULED MEETING OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY BOARD OF 7 8 SUPERVISORS. TODAY, IS TUESDAY MAY 2ND. WE TAKE NOTE THAT THE 9 FULL COMPLEMENT OF THE BOARD IS PRESENT. THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE 10 OFFICER, COUNTY COUNSEL, THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER, AND THE SERGEANT-AT-ARMS ARE ALL HERE TO ASSIST. WE WILL BEGIN TODAY'S 11 BOARD MEETING WITH THE COUNTY'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT. THE 12 COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES RECOGNIZES THAT WE OCCUPY LAND 13 ORIGINALLY AND STILL INHABITED AND CARED FOR BY THE TONGVA, 14 THE TATAVIAM, SERRANO, KIZH, AND CHUMASH PEOPLES. WE HONOR AND 15 PAY RESPECT TO THEIR ELDERS AND DESCENDANTS, PAST, PRESENT, 16 AND EMERGING, AS THEY CONTINUE THEIR STEWARDSHIP OF THESE 17 18 LANDS AND WATERS. WE ACKNOWLEDGE THAT SETTLER COLONIZATION 19 RESULTED IN LAND SEIZURE, DISEASE, SUBJUGATION, SLAVERY, 20 RELOCATION, BROKEN PROMISES, GENOCIDE, AND MULTIGENERATIONAL TRAUMA. THIS ACKNOWLEDGMENT DEMONSTRATES OUR RESPONSIBILITY 21 AND COMMITMENT TO TRUTH, HEALING, AND RECONCILIATION AND TO 22 ELEVATING THE STORIES, CULTURE, AND COMMUNITY OF THE ORIGINAL 23 INHABITANTS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. WE ARE GRATEFUL TO HAVE THE 24 25 OPPORTUNITY TO LIVE AND WORK ON THESE ANCESTRAL LANDS. WE ARE

- 2 PEOPLES AND LOCAL TRIBAL GOVERNMENTS, INCLUDING (IN NO

- 4 INDIANS, THE GABRIELINO TONGVA INDIANS OF CALIFORNIA TRIBAL
- 5 COUNCIL, THE GABRIELENO/TONGVA SAN GABRIEL BAND OF MISSION
- 6 INDIANS, THE GABRIELENO BAND OF MISSION INDIANS, KIZH NATION,
- 7 THE SAN MANUEL BAND OF MISSION INDIANS, THE SAN FERNANDO BAND
- 8 OF MISSION INDIANS. THE INVOCATION THIS MORNING WILL BE LED BY
- 9 PASTOR MARIA CAMARIO, FOUNDER AND DIRECTOR OF THIRD STEP

- 12 JANICE BOWMAN, FORMER E3 SEAMAN UNITED STATES COAST GUARD FROM
- 13 THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES IN THE FIFTH DISTRICT. IF YOU ARE ABLE
- 14 THIS MORNING, PLEASE STAND.

- 16 MARIA CAMARIO: OUR ALMIGHTY, SOVEREIGN, HOLY FATHER. WE HUMBLY
- 17 COME BEFORE YOU ACKNOWLEDGING OUR NEED OF YOUR PRESENCE OVER
- 18 TODAY'S PROCEEDINGS. WE ASK THAT YOUR WILL WILL BE DONE HERE
- 19 IN THIS SPACE, AS IT IS IN HEAVEN. WE ADMIT OUR NEED OF AND
- 20 DEPENDENCE ON YOUR WISDOM OVER ALL THE MATTERS THAT WILL BE
- 21 DISCUSSED AND DECIDED ON TODAY. LORD, WE ASK THAT YOUR HOLY
- 22 SPIRIT HOVER OVER OUR COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AS THEY
- 23 SERVE THIS BEAUTIFUL CITY OF ANGELS WITH DILIGENCE,
- 24 PERSEVERANCE, AND FORTITUDE. LORD, EQUIP YOUR COUNTY SERVANTS
- 25 WITH COURAGE AND CONFIDENCE TO CONDUCT THE AFFAIRS OF THIS



- 1 GREAT CITY WITH HUMILITY, GOOD JUDGMENT, AND RECTITUDE. WE ASK
- 2 FOR YOUR PEACE TO RULE AND REIGN OVER THE AFFAIRS OF THIS
- 3 MEETING, OVER EACH HOUSEHOLD OF LOS ANGELES, OVER OUR SCHOOLS,
- 4 OUR PARKS, OUR PLACES OF RECREATION. WE ASK FOR YOUR
- 5 PROTECTION OF AND STRENGTH TO OUR FIRST RESPONDERS, OUR
- 6 MEDICAL INSTITUTIONS, OUR JUDICIARIES, OUR HOUSES OF WORSHIP,
- 7 AND OVER ALL OUR CENTERS OF BUSINESS. DEAR GOD, DELIVER OUR
- 8 COMMUNITIES FROM EVIL. WE PRAY FOR THOSE IN NEED THAT
- 9 PROVISION WILL COME QUICKLY. WE ALSO PRAY FOR THOSE OF US WHO
- 10 HAVE BEEN ABUNDANTLY BLESSED THAT WE WILL BE SENSITIVE AND
- 11 RESPONSIVE TO NEED WHEN PRESENTED. GOD, WE THANK YOU FOR YOUR
- 12 AMAZING AND NEVER-ENDING LOVE. MAY YOUR GOODNESS AND MERCY
- 13 FOLLOW US ALWAYS, FOR YOURS IS THE KINGDOM, AND THE POWER, AND
- 14 THE GLORY FOREVER AND EVER, AMEN.

- 4 THAT HAS CONTINUED TO SUPPORT ATHLETIC ACTIVITIES FOR OUR
- 5 YOUTH IN L.A. COUNTY THROUGH THE FOUNDATION. SO ACTUALLY, IT
- 6 WAS VERY SUCCESSFUL. NEXT SPEAKER, PLEASE.

- 8 JAMES NELSON: HELLO. MY NAME IS JAMES NELSON. I AM WITH
- 9 DIGNITY AND POWER NOW, WHERE I'M A PROGRAMS AND CAMPAIGN
- 10 MANAGER. I OPPOSE THIS MOTION. AND I OPPOSE THIS MOTION
- 11 BECAUSE I WAS IN THE ONES IN '84 THAT GOT MARGINALIZED AND
- 12 SPENT LIFE IN PRISON, 29 YEARS, BECAUSE THEY WANTED TO CLEAN
- 13 UP THE COMMUNITY FOR THE OLYMPICS. WE KNOW THAT THAT TAKE

- 18 IS. WHAT WE ARE DOING THROUGH THIS MOTION AND THE SERIES OF
- 19 MOTIONS WE HAVE UNDERTAKEN AT METRO IS TO BRING MORE EOUITY
- 20 AND CULTURAL INVOLVEMENT BECAUSE WE KNOW EXACTLY WHAT YOU ARE
- 21 SAYING TO THOSE THAT CAME AND SPOKE TO US. WE KNOW THAT PEOPLE
- 22 IN EAST L.A., SAN GABRIEL VALLEY, AND PLACES WHERE I GREW UP

- 5 THE PAINFUL RISE OF ANTI-A.A.P.I. HATE INCIDENTS. I ALSO WANT
- 6 TO POINT OUT THAT THROUGH OUR DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH,
- 7 BECAUSE WE'RE ALSO CELEBRATING THAT MONTH, THAT OUR DR. LISA
- 8 WONG INITIATED AN ACTIVITY CALLED TEA TIME. SHE DID THIS RIGHT
- 9 AFTER THE HORRIBLE SHOOTING THAT TOOK PLACE IN MONTEREY PARK.
- 10 SHE HAS BEEN SENDING OUT HER STAFF TO MEET ON A REGULAR BASIS
- 11 AT THE LANGLEY COMMUNITY CENTER, DURING NOONTIME, TO HELP

- 10 VAST IMPORTANT CONTRIBUTIONS TO OUR REGION. AND IT SPEAKS
- 11 VOLUMES THAT WE HAVE SO MANY INCREDIBLE EMPLOYEE
- 12 ORGANIZATIONS, WHICH REFLECT THE DIVERSITY OF THE COUNTY AS
- 13 WELL. THIS YEAR IS ESPECIALLY MEANINGFUL AS WE HONOR THE THREE

- 18 IT IS AN IMPORTANT REMINDER OF THE COUNTLESS CONTRIBUTIONS OF
- 19 THE A.A.P.I. COMMUNITY HERE IN LOS ANGELES AND THROUGHOUT THE
- 20 COUNTRY. THIS MONTH IS THE CELEBRATION OF THE PROUD AND
- 21 DIVERSE HISTORY AND HERITAGE THAT THIS COMMUNITY HAS BROUGHT
- 22 TO OUR COUNTRY AND TO LOS ANGELES COUNTY, AND I AM EXCITED FOR
- 23 ALL OF THE EVENTS AND INITIATIVES THAT WILL BE TAKING PLACE

- 4 HATE. EVEN WORSE, PHYSICAL INCIDENTS OF HATE ROSE FROM ABOUT
- 5 11% IN 2020 TO 17% IN 2021. MEMBERS OF THE A.A.P.I. COMMUNITY
- 6 REGULARLY REPORT FEELING UNSAFE IN PUBLIC, UNSAFE ON PUBLIC
- 7 TRANSPORTATION, AND EVEN UNSAFE IN THEIR OWN COMMUNITIES. WE
- 8 CANNOT ALLOW MEMBERS OF OUR COMMUNITIES TO BE AFRAID OF
- 9 PHYSICAL ATTACKS, RACIAL SLURS, AND VERBAL THREATS. THIS
- 10 MOTION IS IMPORTANT BECAUSE IT BOTH SUPPORTS THE HERITAGE AND
- 11 CONTRIBUTIONSOF THE COMMUNITY AND ALSO RECOGNIZE THAT THAT THE
- 12 COMMUNITY IS FACING SIGNIFICANT AND TERRIFYING THREATS THAT WE
- 13 MUST JOINTLY WORK ON TOGETHER TO ELIMINATE SO THAT THE
- 14 A.A.P.I. COMMUNITY THE FEELS SAFE IN THEIR COMMUNITIES. IT IS
- 15 ESSENTIAL THAT WE STEP UP. IT IS NOT FOR THE A.A.P.I.
- 16 COMMUNITY TO TAKE ACTION ON THEIR OWN. THIS IS NOT THEIR
- 17 PROBLEM. THIS IS A PROBLEM OF PEOPLE THAT ARE IMPOSING THEIR
- 18 HATE AND PREJUDICE ON THE PREJUDICE. I AM HONORED TO SUPPORT
- 19 THIS MOTION BY COLLEAGUES, AND I AM PROUD TO STAND WITH THE
- 20 A.A.P.I. COMMUNITY. IT IS ESSENTIAL TO SAY THAT L.A. COUNTY
- 21 WILL BE A HOME FOR EVERYONE, FOR EVERY COMMUNITY, FOR EVERY
- 22 PERSON THAT WISHES TO FEEL SAFE, WELCOME, AND AT HOME HERE.
- 23 OUR WORDS ARE SIMPLY NOT ENOUGH. IT IS OUR ACTIONS THAT WILL
- 24 SHOW WHETHER WE ARE TRULY HONORING THE MEANING OF THIS MONTH
- 25 AND THIS MOTION. THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

- 14 TALK ABOUT AND UNDERSTAND ON A DEEPLY CELLULAR LEVEL THE STOP
- 15 ASIAN HATE MOVEMENT THAT THE COUNTY HAS FUNDED AND HAS A
- 16 DEPARTMENT TO GO FORWARD. AND SO, I THINK IT IS ALWAYS
- 17 IMPORTANT TO ME WHEN WE ACKNOWLEDGE ETHNIC GROUPS IN THESE
- 18 MONTHS THAT WE THINK ABOUT ALSO MEANINGFUL WAYS IN WHICH WE
- 19 ARE WORKING AND BRINGING COUNTY RESOURCES AND COUNTY
- 20 DEPARTMENTS ALONG. WE TALK ABOUT THE NEED FOR FULL LANGUAGE
- 21 ACCESS. YOU BRING IT UP ALL THE TIME, SUPERVISOR SOLIS, IN

- 2 ENGAGE IN. AND SO, OUR LONG TERM PARTNERSHIP WITH K.Y.C.C. TO
- 3 MAKE SURE THAT THE SENIORS IN KOREA TOWN FEEL SAFE. IT WAS
- 4 HEARTBREAKING TO PARTICIPATE IN A FOOD GIVE AWAY A NUMBER OF
- 5 MONTHS AGO AND TO SEE THAT THE SENIORS HAVE BEEN GIVEN
- 6 WHISTLES SO THEY CAN USE IT TO ALARM IF THEY FEEL THREATENED
- 7 IN ANY KIND OF WAY. SO WE HAVE A LONG WAY TO GO IN TERMS OF

- 3 MISSING AND MURDERED INDIGENOUS WOMEN CRISIS REQUIRES THAT ALL
- 4 GOVERNMENTS ACROSS THE UNITED STATES ENHANCE THE PROTECTION OF

- 15 ON-SITE CLINICAL TREATMENT SERVICES, AND THESE ARE ALSO
- 16 LICENSED AS WELL. WE HAVE CRISIS RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT
- 17 PROGRAMS, AND THEN FOR EXTENDED RESIDENTIAL, WE HAVE E.R.S.,
- 18 WHICH IS OUR ENRICHED RESIDENTIAL SERVICES. NEXT, WE HAVE OUR
- 19 LICENSED RESIDENTIAL CARE. THESE ARE KNOWN AS OUR BOARD AND
- 20 CARES OR ADULT RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES. AND THEY ARE ENRICHED
- 21 RESIDENTIAL CARE. WE HAVE INTERIM HOUSING. THAT IS SHELTER
- 22 WITH SUPPORTIVE SERVICES. THESE ARE NOT LICENSED. AND THEN WE
- 23 HAVE OUR PERMANENT HOUSING, WHICH THE IS PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE
- 24 HOUSING. THESE ARE UNLICENSED BUT THAT COME WITH SUPPORTIVE
- 25 SERVICES. AND THAT IS SORT OF OUR ARRAY OF CARE FOR THE



- 1 DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH. AND I THINK THAT'S A VERY
- 2 IMPORTANT ASPECT OF THIS, OF THE BED CONTINUUM, TO EMPHASIZE
- 3 THAT IT IS A CONTINUUM BECAUSE OUR CLIENTS AND THE RESIDENTS
- 4 OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY NEED A FULL CONTINUUM OF CARE. IT IS NOT
- 5 ALL IN THE IN-PATIENT PSYCHIATRIC ORSUBACUTE OR ADULT
- 6 RESIDENTIAL FACILITIES. WE HAVE PEOPLE ACROSS THOSE LEVELS OF
- 7 NEEDS. NEXT SLIDE. SO OUR NEXT STEPS ARE THAT THE DEPARTMENT
- 8 OF MENTAL HEALTH, D.H.S., AND DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH, AND
- 9 JUSTICE CARE AND OPPORTUNITIES DEPARTMENT WILL PROVIDE
- 10 PERIODIC UPDATES ON THE STATUS OF THEIR MENTAL HEALTH AND
- 11 SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER BEDS. AND MAY 16TH, 2023, THERE WILL BE
- 12 A UPDATE THAT WILL FOCUS ON THE NUMBER OF CURRENT BEDS, BEDS
- 13 IN THE PIPELINE, AND FUNDING FOR THESE BEDS. I THINK THAT
- 14 CONCLUDES MY PRESENTATION.

- 16 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: THANK YOU, DR. WONG, FOR THAT PRESENTATION.
- 17 I THINK IT IS REALLY HELPFUL TO EVERYONE TO EXPLAIN THE
- 18 DIFFERENT TYPES OF BEDS THAT WE HAVE TO SUPPORT OUR RESIDENTS
- 19 WHO ARE STRUGGLING WITH MENTAL ILLNESS BECAUSE MANY TIMES WE
- 20 SAY WE NEED 1,000 MENTAL HEALTH BEDS OR WHATEVER. AND I DON'T
- 21 THINK A LOT UNDERSTAND THE DIFFERENCE KINDS, AND THEY ARE ALL
- 22 UNIQUE, AND THEY SUPPORT A SPECIFIC POPULATION. SO, THANK YOU
- 23 FOR BREAKING THAT DOWN.I KNOW WE HAVEN'T REALLY TALKED ABOUT
- 24 SPECIFICALLY THE NUMBER OF EACH TYPE OF BED, WHICH I THINK YOU
- 25 WILL UPDATE US ON AT OUR NEXT BOARD MEETING, BUT I'M WONDERING



- 1 IS THERE A SPECIFIC CATEGORY OF BED THAT WE ARE MOST IN NEED
- 2 OF OF THOSE CATEGORIES HERE IN L.A. COUNTY?

- 4 DR.WONG: PROBABLY THE CATEGORY WE ARE MOST IN NEED OF IS THE
- 5 SUBACUTE CATEGORY, AND THAT INCLUDES OUR SKILLED NURSING
- 6 FACILITIES, OUR MENTAL HEALTH REHABILITATION CENTERS, OUR
- 7 MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS RESIDENTIAL, AND OUR I.M.D.S.

8

- 9 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: AND I KNOW, AGAIN, WE -- THROUGH THE
- 10 ALLIANCE LAWSUIT, WE HAVE AGREED TO GET UP 1,000 BEDS. DID YOU
- 11 -- CAN YOU TELL US WHAT KINDS OF BEDS, WHAT TYPES OF BEDS ARE
- 12 THOSE THAT WE ARE TALKING ABOUT?

13

- 14 DR. WONG: THOSE 1,000 BEDS SPAN THE WHOLE ARRAY OF BEDS, SO
- 15 EVERYTHING FROM IN-PATIENT PSYCHIATRIC TO THE ENRICHED
- 16 RESIDENTIAL CARE.

17

18 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: AND HAVE YOU BROKEN THOSE DOWN BY NUMBERS?

19

- 20 DR. WONG: YOU KNOW, I DON'T HAVE THOSE BY NUMBERS RIGHT NOW
- 21 BECAUSE WE WEREN'T EXPECTING TO DO THAT UNTIL THE NEXT BOARD
- 22 MEETING. I CAN GET THEM TO YOU.

- 24 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: GREAT, I APPRECIATE THAT. OKAY, THANK YOU,
- 25 AND I KNOW -- LET ME JUST ASK ONE MORE THING THAT ONE OF THE



- 1 GOALS IN THE PAST HAS BEEN TO CREATE A BED TRACKING SYSTEM
- 2 THAT COULD BE USED TO TRACK THESE BEDS ACROSS THE COUNTY SO
- 3 THAT OUR PROVIDERS, OUR CLINICIANS, CAN FIND AVAILABLE BEDS
- 4 BECAUSE THAT'S ALWAYS KIND OF A SCRAMBLE. WHAT'S THE STATUS OF
- 5 THAT BED TRACKER?

- 7 DR. WONG: I WILL DEFER THAT QUESTION TO OUR DEPARTMENT HEAD
- 8 OVER J.C.O.D., JUDGE ARMSTEAD.

9

10 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: WELCOME, JUDGE.

11

- 12 JUDGE ARMSTEAD: SORRY, THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR THAT QUESTION,
- 13 CHAIR. WE FINISHED THE SOLICITATION AND HAVE SELECTED A
- 14 VENDOR, SO THEY ARE FINALIZING -- IT TOOK A LONG TIME TO GET
- 15 THERE. FIRST, WE HAD TO COME UP WITH THE LANGUAGE WE WILL USE,
- 16 SO WE HAVE SELECTED A VENDOR. AND WE ARE IN THE MIDDLE OF
- 17 FINALIZING THAT PROCESS. WE ARE HOPING TO BE IN CONTRACT BY
- 18 AUGUST AT THE LATEST.

- 20 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: OKAY, GOOD BECAUSE AGAINSOMETIMES THAT CAN
- 21 BE THE MISSING PIECE. WE HAVE THE BEDS BUT TRACKING THEM AND
- 22 FINDING, AGAIN, AND SOME OF THESE ARE CRISIS SITUATIONS, WHERE
- 23 IT NEEDS TO BE FOUND LIKE TONIGHT. AND THE BED TRACKER I THINK
- 24 WAS THE GOAL OF OUR DEPARTMENT AND CERTAINLY OF THIS BOARD. SO



- 1 THAT'S GOOD NEWS. SO, AUGUST YOU THINK IT WILL BE UP AND
- 2 RUNNING.

- 4 JUDGE ARMSTEAD: IT WILL NOT BE UP AND RUNNING BY AUGUST. WE
- 5 WILL BE IN CONTRACT WITH THE VENDOR BY AUGUST.

6

- 7 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: WHAT'S THE TIMELINE FOR IT TO BE UP AND
- 8 RUNNING, DO YOU THINK?

9

- 10 JUDGE ARMSTEAD: PROBABLY A YEAR IN FULL HONESTY. AND THE
- 11 REASON IT MAY PROBABLY WILL BE A YEAR IS BECAUSE EACH
- 12 DEPARTMENT ACTUALLY USES A DIFFERENT SYSTEM, AND IT HAS TO BE
- 13 DESIGNED TO BE ABLE TO SPEAK TO ALL THOSE SYSTEMS. THERE'S
- 14 ALSO CONTRACTUALCHANGES THAT WE WILL HAVE TO MAKE. ALL
- 15 PROVIDERS ARE NOT REQUIRED TO LET US KNOW WHAT BEDS THEY HAVE
- 16 AVAILABLE OR WHEN THEY BECOME AVAILABLE, SO THAT WOULD HAVE TO
- 17 TAKE PLACE. WE ARE ALSO WORKING ON A STANDARDIZATION OF AN
- 18 INTAKE PROCESS, WHERE THEY ASK A CERTAIN SET OF OUESTIONS TO
- 19 IDENTIFY A PERSON'S NEEDS. EVERY DEPARTMENT HAS DIFFERENT
- 20 QUESTIONS THEY ASK. SO WE ARE WORKING ON STREAMLINING THAT,
- 21 AND WE ARE TRYING TO ELIMINATE THE SILOS SO IT CAN BE DONE IN
- 22 A SINGULAR FORM. AND SO, JUST TO GET TO THE POINT THAT WE ALL
- 23 USE THE SAME LANGUAGE OF BEDS, THAT TOOK US ABOUT NINE MONTHS.
- 24 SO IT IS A PROCESS.



- 1 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: WELL, REMEMBER WE ARE IN THE STATE OF
- 2 HOMELESS EMERGENCY.

4 **JUDGE ARMSTEAD:** YES.

5

- 6 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: AND YOU KNOW, THAT IS IN PLACE TO -- TO MOVE
- 7 FASTER KIND OF ALL THE THINGS YOU TALKED ABOUT --

8

- 9 JUDGE ARMSTEAD: RIGHT. PARTICULARLY AS IT RELATES TO
- 10 CONTRACTING.

11

- 12 JUDGE ARMSTEAD: RIGHT, AND THE C.E.O.'S HELPED US. THE C.I.O.
- 13 IS HELPING US WITH THE TECHNOLOGY PIECE AND ALSO HELPING US TO
- 14 TRY TO STREAMLINE THE CONTRACT BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT THAT TAKES
- 15 ALONG TIME TO GET IN CONTRACT WITH A VENDOR.

16

- 17 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: YEAH, I THINK A LOT WOULD BE DISAPPOINTED TO
- 18 HEAR THAT IT WOULDN'T BE UP AND RUNNING FOR ANOTHER YEAR AFTER
- 19 AUGUST. YES, SO ANYTHING WE CAN DO TO -- THIS IS AN ALL HANDS
- 20 ON DECK. ANYTHING WE CAN DO TO STREAMLINE THIS I THINK WOULD
- 21 BE IMPORTANT RIGHT NOW. THANK YOU.

22

23 JUDGE ARMSTEAD: THANK YOU.



- 1 DR. WONG: SO, IN THE INTERIM, THOUGH, MADAM CHAIR, THE
- 2 DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH AND DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH
- 3 AND DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES EACH HAVE THEIR OWN TRACKING
- 4 FOR THEIR BEDS. AND WHAT WE ARE WORKING ON IS HAVING THOSE
- 5 FACILITATED SO THAT THEY CAN -- THEY ARE BETTER ORGANIZED SO
- 6 WE CAN COMMUNICATE WITH EACH OTHER. SO, EVEN WHILE WE WAIT FOR
- 7 AN INTEGRATED SYSTEM TO DO MACRO TRACKING OF ALL THE BEDS, WE
- 8 HAVE THINGS IN PLACE THAT HAVE ALREADY PUT SOME OF OUR BEDS ON
- 9 ELECTRONIC TRACKING, AND WE HAVE BEEN DEVELOPING WAYS FOR OUR
- 10 DEPARTMENTS TO WORK MORE TOGETHER.

- 12 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: GOOD. THANK YOU. THANK YOU FOR THAT. NOW, I
- 13 WILL TURN TO MY COLLEAGUES. FIRST UP, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL.

- 15 SUP. MITCHELL: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. AND JUDGE ARMSTEAD,
- 16 THANK YOU FOR THAT HONEST TIMEFRAME BECAUSE, WHILE WE DO FEEL
- 17 A SENSE OF URGENCY, I ALSO UNDERSTAND THE REALITY OF
- 18 BUREAUCRACY, THE REALITY OF GETTING MULTIPLE DEPARTMENTS THAT
- 19 HAVE DONE THINGS IN ONE WAY TO HAVE A UNIFIED SYSTEM, SO THANK
- 20 YOU FOR THAT HONEST ANSWER. AS PAINFUL AS IT IS TO HEAR, I
- 21 COMPLETELY UNDERSTAND WHY. AND I AM ALSO GLAD TO KNOW THAT
- 22 THERE IS A WORKAROUND, MY TERM NOT YOURS, DR. WONG, IN TERMS
- 23 OF MAKING SURE THAT THE TRACKING THAT IS HAPPENING IN THE TOP
- 24 TIER DEPARTMENTS WHO HAVE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF MANAGING
- 25 CONTRACTS AND BUILDING OUT BEDS ARE IN THE MEANTIME AT LEAST



- 1 NOT OPERATING IN SILOS, AND EVERYBODY KNOWS WHAT EACH IS
- 2 DOING. THANK YOU FOR THIS CHART. THERE HAVE BEEN MULTIPLE
- 3 MOTIONS FILED TO CREATE BEDS AND DIVERT PEOPLE INTO MORE
- 4 APPROPRIATE TREATMENT SETTINGS, AND I THINK IT IS IMPORTANT
- 5 THAT THE BOARD AND THE PUBLIC HAVE FRONT OF MIND WHAT WE MEAN.
- 6 I THINK WE GENERICALLY USE THE TERM BEDS, BUT THEY ARE ALL
- 7 VERY DIFFERENT AND UNIQUE AND REQUIRE DIFFERENT EFFORT. I JUST
- 8 WANT TO CLARIFY FOR THE MAY 16TH MEETING THAT IT WILL INCLUDE
- 9 KIND OF A BREAKDOWN OF WHO IS WORKING ON WHICH BEDS, FOR WHAT
- 10 PURPOSE, AND WITH WHICH FUNDING STREAM. SAY THAT THREE TIMES
- 11 FAST. WITH WHAT MONEY. IS THAT THE KIND OF DATA THAT THE MAY
- 12 16TH BRIEF WILLING INCLUDE?

- 14 DR. WONG: YES, SUPERVISOR MITCHELL. EXCELLENT. AND I AM CLEAR
- 15 THAT THIS TRACKING PROCESS, THIS MONITORING, IF YOU WILL, THAT
- 16 ALLOWS US TO SEE WHERE WE ARE, ALLOWS THE GENERAL PUBLIC TO
- 17 SEE WHERE WE ARE, THE GOAL IS TO -- A RESULTING CLARITY,
- 18 COORDINATION, AND, FROM MY PERSPECTIVE, SMARTER SPENDING, BUT
- 19 NOT DELAYS. THIS EFFORT SHOULD BY NO MEANS DELAY PROGRESS
- 20 TOWARDS STANDING UP BEDS, BUT IT IS AN IMPORTANT MONITORING
- 21 TOOL THAT WE CAN ALL USE TO SEE OUR PROGRESS ACROSS THE
- 22 SPECTRUM AND ACROSS THE NEED. FINALLY, I WOULD SAY THAT IT
- 23 WOULD BE MY HOPE THAT, AFTER THE MAY 16TH BRIEFING, THAT WE
- 24 CAN EXPECT TO HAVE THIS BRIEFING AT LEAST ON A QUARTERLY
- 25 BASIS. AND FINALLY, FOR ME, PER EACH BED, WILL YOU SHOW US THE



- 1 GOAL FOR EACH CATEGORY OF BEDS AND WHERE WE ARE AGAINST THAT
- 2 GOAL? IS THAT A WAY WHICH YOU ARE GOING TO PRESENT IT?

- 4 DR. WONG: YES, YOU MEAN THE NUMERICAL? YES. YES, WE CAN
- 5 DEFINITELY DO THAT.

- 7 SUP. MITCHELL: SO WE CAN SEE THE TYPE OF BED, HOW MANY WE
- 8 INTEND TO BUILD, LIKE 1,000, AND WHERE WE ARE TOWARDS MEETING
- 9 THAT GOAL OF 1,000 BEDS. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. I FOUND THIS
- 10 VERY HELPFUL. THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

11

12 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: THANK YOU, NEXT UP IS SUPERVISOR SOLIS.

- 14 SUP. SOLIS: YES, THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. AND THANK YOU, LISA
- 15 AND ALSO TO JUDGE ARMSTEAD. I AM HAPPY TO SEE BOTH OF YOU
- 16 HERE, AND I ALSO LIKE THIS CHART. I THINK IT IS GREAT, AND I
- 17 GUESS, AS WAS SAID, AT YOUR NEXT MEETING YOU WILL BE ABLE TO
- 18 FILL IN SOME OF THE BLANKS. FOR ME, IT IS ALSO ABOUT WHAT THE
- 19 COSTS ARE FOR EACH BED. SO I AM REALLY CONCERNED ABOUT THAT
- 20 BECAUSE WE KNOW WE ARE SO FAR BEHIND ON THE WAIVER, THE I.M.D,
- 21 AND JUST TRYING TO GET MORE ACUTE AND RECUPERATIVE BEDS UP AND
- 22 GOING. I KNOW SOME OF US HAVE WORKED ON OUR CAMPUSES, OUR
- 23 HEALTH CAMPUSES, TO TRY TO GET THOSE BUILT OUT. AND WE ARE
- 24 WAITING RIGHT NOW FOR FUNDING FROM SACRAMENTO, I THINK, TO SEE
- 25 IF WE WILL BE ABLE TO BEGIN ANOTHER ROUND, BUT WE ARE ALSO



- 1 COMPETING WITH OUTSIDE, FEDERALLY OUALIFIED CLINICS AND OTHER
- 2 PROVIDERS THAT ARE DOING THE SAME THING WE WANT TO DO. SO I
- 3 THINK, AT SOME POINT, IT WOULD BE GREAT TO UNDERSTAND WHAT THE
- 4 WHOLE GLOBAL PICTURE LOOKS LIKE. MAYBE THAT'S AN ASSIGNMENT
- 5 FOR A CONSULTANT TO DO, BUT I THINK IT WOULD HELP US BECAUSE
- 6 WE ALSO PROVIDE FUNDING AND SUPPORT FOR THAT, WHETHER IT IS
- 7 THROUGH OUR OWN MEASURE H, L.A.H.S.A., OUR OWN FUNDING STREAMS
- 8 AND THINGS OF THAT NATURE, BUT TO UNDERSTAND BECAUSE I THINK
- 9 THE PUBLIC WANTS TO KNOW OKAY, WE ARE SPENDING SO MUCH MONEY,
- 10 OR HOW IS IT THAT WE ARE SPENDING THAT MONEY. AND THEY NEED TO
- 11 REALIZE, TOO, WHAT THE COSTS ARE FOR THE ACUITY. AND I DON'T
- 12 THINK THAT WE HAVE DONE A GOOD JOB OF EXPLAINING TO THE PUBLIC
- 13 WHAT THAT REALLY MEANS. THAT IT IS 24 HOURS. AND THAT IT IS
- 14 AROUND THE CLOCK. AND THAT YOU HAVE TO HAVE LICENSING, ALL
- 15 KINDS OF CARE THAT REALLY COST THE TAXPAYER A LOT OF MONEY.
- 16 AND I THINK IT IS A GOOD INVESTMENT, BUT I THINK WE SHOULD BE
- 17 OUT THERE AND NOT AFRAID OF BEING ABLE TO EXPLAIN THAT TO
- 18 THEM. THE OTHER THING I WOULD ASK TOO IS WHERE IS THE
- 19 GEOGRAPHIC LOCATION OF THESE BEDS. SO I WANT TO KNOW IF ONE
- 20 AREA ISN'T JUST BEING SATURATED AND IF WE ARE REALLY SPREADING
- 21 IT OUT AROUND THE COUNTY. AND I KNOW THAT WE HAVE ISSUES WITH
- 22 SOME OF OUR -- FROM TIME TO TIME WITH SOME OF OUR OWN LOCAL
- 23 GOVERNMENTS AND EVEN UNINCORPORATED AREAS, BUT WE NEED TO
- 24 START TO BE REALISTIC WHERE THE NEED IS, AND WHERE THE
- 25 GEOGRAPHY, POPULATION, HOW CAN WE BET ADDRESS THAT. AND I KNOW



- 1 WE WILL HAVE MORE TOOLS, I HOPE, FROM THE STATE TO DO THIS.
- 2 AND I AM VERY INTERESTED IN FINDING OUT TOO HOW SOME OF THESE
- 3 BEDS ARE ALSO GOING TO ADDRESS THE CARE COURT POPULATION, THE
- 4 MISTS, THE FISTS, AND I THINK WE WILL BE TALKING ABOUT THAT I
- 5 GUESS WITH D.H.S. WITH HOW IMPORTANT THAT IS AS WELL BECAUSE
- 6 THOSE ARE, IN SOME CASES, LOCKED FACILITIES. AND WHERE WILL
- 7 THEY BE PLACED? SO HAVING ALL OF THAT IN A WEBSITE, GEOGRAPHY,
- 8 MAPPING, G.P.S. TYPE OF INSTRUMENT, I THINK CAN BE VERY
- 9 HELPFUL FOR NOT JUST US BUT ALSO FOR PROVIDERS. I HEAR THAT
- 10 TIME AND TIME AGAIN. HILDA, SUPERVISORS, NO BEDS. WE HAVE A
- 11 FAMILY OR WE HAVE CLIENTS HERE, WHERE DO WE SEND THEM. AND THE
- 12 LAST THING WE WANT TO DO IS CONTINUE TO TURN PEOPLE AWAY, BUT
- 13 I LIKE THE FACT, DR. WONG, YOU DIDN'T GO INTO A LOT OF IT, BUT
- 14 YOU MENTIONED ON YOUR SLIDE HERE THE PEOPLE THAT USE THE BEDS.
- 15 YOU SAY PEOPLE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS, THE PROBATION
- 16 POPULATION, THE JAIL POPULATION. AND I'D LIKE TO KNOW MORE
- 17 ABOUT WHAT WE ARE DOING IN THE JAILS BEFORE THEY ARE RELEASED
- 18 BECAUSE I KNOW WE HAVE SOME PROPOSALS TO DO THAT, AND THE
- 19 L.P.S. CONSERVATEES, AS WE SAID, AND THEN PERSONS MENTALLY
- 20 INCOMPETENT TO STAND TRIAL. SO JUST GETTING MORE INFORMATION
- 21 FROM THE PANEL COULD BE HELPFUL. BUT I THANK YOU FOR THIS. IT
- 22 IS A GOOD START. WE NEED TO DO MORE, THOUGH. AND I, TOO, FEEL
- 23 THAT WE NEED TO PUSH FASTER SO WE DON'T HAVE TO WAIT UNTIL
- 24 NEXT AUGUST TO GET ALL OF THIS UP AND GOING. WE ARE WITH YOU.



- 1 I AM. I TOTALLY WANT TO SEE THIS HAPPEN AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.
- 2 THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

- 4 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: THANK YOU, AND WE HAVE BEEN JOINED BY DR.
- 5 FERRER AND DR. CHRISTINA GHALY, AS WELL. ONE OF THE THINGS I
- 6 THINK THAT WAS MADE CLEAR TO US I THINK THE FIRST TIME I WAS
- 7 IN COURT WAS ABOUT THE SEPARATION OF BEDS AND SOME OF THEM
- 8 BEING PUBLIC HEALTH BEDS, SUBSTANCE ABUSE BEDS, SO CLEARLY ALL
- 9 OF YOU HAVE A LOT TO DO WITH HOW WE SET UP MORE OF THESE AND
- 10 PARTICULARLY IN TERMS OF THE NUMBERS WHERE THE NEED IS. SO
- 11 THANK YOU FOR JOINING US. IF YOU WANT TO SAY ANYTHING NOW OR
- 12 WAIT FOR A QUESTION, DID YOU HAVE ANYTHING YOU WANTED TO ADD
- 13 TO THIS PRESENTATION?

- 15 DR. GHALY: NO, THANK YOU, SUPERVISORS FOR THE CHANCE TO GO
- OVER THE BED TYPES. WE HAVE HEARD THE COMMENTS, AND WE'RE
- 17 HAPPY TO COME BACK IN A COUPLE OF WEEKS TO TALK ABOUT THE
- 18 FUNDING STREAMS. I THINK ALSO IMPORTANT IN PART FROM
- 19 SUPERVISOR SOLIS'S COMMENTS AND OTHERS TO TALK ABOUT THE
- 20 DIFFERENT POPULATIONS BECAUSE IT IS ONE LAYER TO TALK ABOUT
- 21 THE TYPES OF BEDS, BUT THEN FOR A GIVEN TYPE OF BED, IT MAY BE
- 22 SPECIFIC TO A CERTAIN POPULATION. FOR EXAMPLE, THOSE WHO ARE
- 23 INCOMPETENT TO STAND TRIAL IS JUST ONE EXAMPLE, OR IT MIGHT BE
- 24 FOR THE GENERAL POPULATION, AND WE CAN WALK THROUGH SOME OF



- 1 THAT. AND THEN THE FUNDING STREAMS STEM FROM SOME OF THAT. SO
- 2 WE CAN PROVIDE THAT FURTHER INFORMATION.

4 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: GREAT. DR. FERRER.

5

- 6 DR. FERRER: YEAH, THANK YOU SO MUCH, SUPERVISORS. I APPRECIATE
- 7 THIS MOTION, AND I APPRECIATE THE FOCUS, IN PARTICULAR, AND I
- 8 WANT TO JUST THANK YOU FOR RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF
- 9 INCLUDING SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER TREATMENT AND THE ENTIRE
- 10 CONTINUUM OF SERVICES, THAT PEOPLE STRUGGLING WITH A SUBSTANCE
- 11 USE DISORDER ARE ENTITLED TO, YOU KNOW, WE RUN A MEDI-CAL
- 12 DELIVERY SYSTEM. SO I WANT TO CALL IT THE SAFETY NET SYSTEM
- 13 FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE STRUGGLING WITH SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS.
- 14 AND IN THAT SYSTEM, THERE'S ABOUT 2500 RESIDENTIAL BEDS THAT
- 15 ARE MANAGED BY A VAST NETWORK OF COMMUNITY PROVIDERS, BUT
- 16 THERE'S ANOTHER 3,000 BEDS THAT ARE OUT THERE FOR PEOPLE WHO
- 17 ARE EITHER PAYING THEMSELVES OR HAVE COMMERCIAL INSURANCE. AND
- 18 WHILE WE KNOW THOSE BEDS ARE THERE, WE ARE NOT MANAGING THOSE
- 19 BEDS. SO I THINK SOMETIMES IT IS ALSO HELPFUL TO KNOW THAT WE
- 20 MANAGE THE SAFETY NET SYSTEM, AND IT IS LARGE. AND IT HAS A
- 21 LOT OF SERVICES, AGAIN, ALONG A CONTINUUM, BUT THERE ARE
- 22 SERVICES THAT ARE AVAILABLE OUTSIDE OF THE SAFETY NET SYSTEM
- 23 FOR OTHER RESIDENTS.



- 1 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: YOU ARE TALKING ABOUT SOME OF THOSE PRIVATE
- 2 SUBSTANCE ABUSE PROGRAMS? THAT, IF YOU HAVE A LOT OF MONEY --

- 4 DR. FERRER: RIGHT, ORCOMMERCIAL INSURANCE THAT ALLOWS YOU TO
- 5 GO TO THOSE PLACES.

6

- 7 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: YEAH. SO THERE ARE THOSE, BUT WE DON'T
- 8 MANAGE THOSE.

9

- 10 DR. FERRER: WE DON'T MANAGE THOSE. OUR FOCUS REALLY IS ON
- 11 CREATING THIS VERY BROAD BASED, AND I APPRECIATED SUPERVISOR
- 12 SOLIS, IT HAS TO BE A NETWORK THAT PEOPLE CAN ACCESS FROM ALL
- 13 OVER THE COUNTY. AND WE ARE BLESSED BECAUSE WE HAVE DOZENS AND
- 14 DOZENS OF PROVIDERS. I THINK WE HAVE 88 TREATMENT PROVIDERS.
- 15 THEY HAVE 350 SITES IN THIS NETWORK OF SERVICES.

16

- 17 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: FOR SUBSTANCE ABUSE -- BECAUSE I FEEL LIKE
- 18 THAT'S ONE OF THE ONES THAT IS HARD TO FIND A BED FOR. I KNOW
- 19 WHEN OUR OFFICE HAS HAD CALLS FROM PEOPLE, SPECIFICALLY, IT
- 20 WAS VERY DIFFICULT TO FIND A PLACE FOR A PERSON WHO WAS
- 21 STRUGGLING WITH SUBSTANCE ABUSE. I FEEL LIKE THAT WAS
- 22 DIFFICULT.

- 24 DR. FERRER: YEAH. WE DO HAVE A STATE OF THE ART BED TRACKING
- 25 SYSTEM JUST FOR -- OUR SUBSTANCE USE BEDS IN THIS SAFETY NET



- 1 SYSTEM. ONE OF THE ISSUES IS WE CONTRACT FOR X AMOUNT OF BEDS,
- 2 BUT THOSE BEDS AREN'T EXCLUSIVELY OURS BY THE PROVIDER. SO IT
- 3 GETS COMPLICATED.

- 5 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: AND I KNOW MAYOR BASS, EVERY TIME SHE TALKS,
- 6 SHE THINKS THAT THE LENT OF STAY IS TOO SHORT. THE 30 DAYS
- 7 JUST ISN'T ENOUGH TO -- FOR SOMEONE WHO HAS A SERIOUS LONGTERM
- 8 YEARS OF BEING ADDICTED, 30 DAYS IS NOT ENOUGH, BUT I AM
- 9 WONDERING, IF WE WORKED TO GET THAT LENGTHENED DOES THAT HURT
- 10 OR HELP FINDING THE BEDS BECAUSE NOW WE ARE OCCUPYING THE BEDS
- 11 LONGER, BUT ON THE OTHER HAND, MAYBE WE HAVE A BETTER CHANCE
- 12 OF SUCCESS FOR SOMEONE WHO THEN DOESN'T -- END UP BACK ON THE
- 13 STREETS NOT REALLY KICKING THE ADDICTION AND THEN HAVING TO --
- 14 I DON'T KNOW.

15

- 16 DR. FERRER: THE BED STAY IN RESIDENTIAL PROGRAMS IS IF IT IS
- 17 MEDICALLY NECESSARY. SO IT ISN'T A 30 DAY CAP.

18

19 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: SO IT COULD BE 60 DAYS.

- 21 DR. FERRER: IF IT IS MEDICALLY NECESSARY. I THINK THE ISSUE,
- 22 WHICH IS WHAT I THINK YOU HAVE HIGHLIGHTED, SUPERVISOR HAHN,
- 23 IS IF IT ISN'T MEDICALLY NECESSARY, AND PEOPLE ARE REMAINING
- 24 IN OUR RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT PROGRAMS BECAUSE WE DON'T HAVE
- 25 HOUSING FOR THEM, WE DON'T HAVE ENOUGH RECOVERY BRIDGE



- 1 HOUSING. SO WE HAVE ABOUT 2500 RESIDENTIAL BEDS. WE ONLY HAVE
- 2 1200 RECOVERY BRIDGE HOUSING BEDS. SO THAT CONTINUUM, WE WANT
- 3 TO MOVE FROM RESIDENTIAL TO AN OUTPATIENT SETTING, WHICH IS
- 4 WHAT RECOVERY BRIDGE HOUSING ALLOWS FOR, PEOPLE IN AN
- 5 OUTPATIENT SETTING. WE HAVE ONLY HALF THE NUMBER OF BEDS, SO
- 6 IF WE HAVE A LARGE POPULATION OF PEOPLE WHO ARE HAVE UNSTABLE
- 7 HOUSING, WE ARE GOING TO GET BOTTLENECK.

9 SUP. HAHN, CHAIRL RIGHT, COMPLICATED. SUPERVISOR BARGER.

10

- 11 SUP. BARGER: THANK YOU. AND I AGREE WITH MAYOR BASS REGARDING
- 12 THE LENGTH OF STAY. AND I WOULD ARGUE THAT ACTUALLY -- I THINK
- 13 STEVE LOPEZ DID AN ARTICLE ON THIS ABOUT A PATIENT WHO WENT TO
- 14 PRINCETON, I BELIEVE, AND WAS ON THE STREET. TRIED TO GET A
- 15 BED. COULDN'T BECAUSE HE FELT UNDER THE CATEGORY OF UNINSURED.
- 16 AND ONE OF HIS CLASSMATES HELPED AND CALLED AND SAID I WILL
- 17 PAY FOR THE BED, AND THEN THEY HAD A BED AVAILABLE. SO, TO
- 18 YOUR POINT, AND I HAVE ALWAYS TRIED TO UNDERSTAND THIS, DR.
- 19 FERRER, WE PAY FOR THOSE BEDS. AND SO, I CAN'T FIGURE OUT WHY
- 20 THAT HAPPENED. BUT HAVING SAID THAT, I AGREE WITH SUPERVISOR
- 21 MITCHELL, DR. ARMSTEAD. THANK YOU FOR BEING HONEST ON THE
- 22 LENGTH OF TIME. AND DOES H.I.P.A.A. PLAY A ROLE IN HOW WE ARE
- 23 GOING ABOUT DOING THIS INTEGRATED SYSTEM? IS THAT PART OF THE
- 24 COMPLICATION, TOO?



- 1 JUDGE ARMSTEAD: THANK YOU FOR THAT QUESTION, SUPERVISOR. YES,
- 2 IT IS. A PERSON HAS TO SIGN A RELEASE SO THE INFORMATION CAN
- 3 BE SHARED THROUGH DEPARTMENTS AND THE ORGANIZATIONS, AS WELL.
- 4 AND ALSO TO THE OTHER QUESTION RIGHT BEFORE THAT, MEDI-CAL
- 5 SORT OF GIVES GUIDELINES. SO I CAN JUST TELL YOU FROM THE
- 6 JUDICIAL SIDE. WE WANTED PEOPLE IN TREATMENT HOUSING FOR A
- 7 VERY LONG TIME, AND WE COULDN'T GET THEM IN THERE BECAUSE, AS
- 8 DR. FERRER SAID, IT WASN'T DEEMED TO BE MEDICALLY NECESSARY.
- 9 SO THEY COULD GIVE THEM OUTPATIENT, BUT IF THEY DIDN'T HAVE
- 10 THE CASE MANAGEMENT AND THE HOUSING TO GO ALONG WITH IT, WE
- 11 JUST DIDN'T SEE PEOPLE -- THEY WEREN'T SUCCESSFUL. AND THAT'S
- 12 WHAT IS GREAT ABOUT WHAT IS HAPPENING NOW IN THE COUNTY IS
- 13 THAT THE DEPARTMENTS ARE LOOKING AT HOW TO LEVERAGE
- 14 OPPORTUNITIES AND FUNDING SO THAT WE CAN GIVE THEM THE
- 15 SERVICES ALONG WITH THE HOUSING. AND SO, EVEN IF YOU LOOK AT
- 16 THE CONTINUUM OF CARE, AND WE ARE TALKING ABOUT DIFFERENT
- 17 BEDS, THOSE ARE OFTEN LAYERED WITH SERVICES. WE JUST DON'T
- 18 HAVE ENOUGH. BUT YOU NEED THE INTENSIVE CASE MANAGEMENT. YOU
- 19 NEED THE INTENSIVE SERVICES FOR TREATMENT, BUT YOU ALSO NEED A
- 20 STRUCTURED HOUSING SETTING FOR A LOT OF FOLKS TO HELP THEM BE
- 21 SUCCESSFUL.

- 23 SUP. BARGER: AND THEN TO YOUR POINT ABOUT THE MEDICAL
- 24 NECESSITY, BUT WHEN I WENT OUT AND TOURED IMPACT, ONE OF THEIR
- 25 CONCERNS -- I'M SORRY I'M GOING AROUND YOU. NO YOU'RE FINE.



- 1 WHEN I WENT OUT TO IMPACT, IT'S A 30-DAY, AND I KNOW THEY'RE
- 2 CONSIDERING EXTENDING THAT TO 45-DAY STAY THAT THEY WILL
- 3 REIMBURSE FOR, AND THEN THEY MOVE THEM TO SOBER LIVING. SO, I
- 4 GUESS MY OUESTION IS TWOFOLD. WHERE IS SOBER LIVING ON THE
- 5 FORM THAT YOU PUT TOGETHER?

- 7 DR. FERRER: I MEAN, SOBER LIVING IS A REALLY A HOUSING
- 8 PROGRAM. IN THAT SECTION WHERE WE TALK ABOUT PERMANENT
- 9 HOUSING, WE HAVEN'T REALLY BEEN FUNDING SOBER HOUSING. WE FUND
- 10 RECOVERY BRIDGE HOUSING, BUT IT'S ONLY FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE IN
- 11 OUTPATIENT SERVICES. IF YOU LEAVE YOUR OUTPATIENT SERVICE, YOU
- 12 CANNOT STAY IN RECOVERY BRIDGE HOUSING. SO, SOMEBODY WHO HAS
- 13 COMPLETED A PROGRAM AND WANTS TO THEN LIVE IN WHAT WE ARE
- 14 GOING TO CALL SOBER HOUSING, WE REALLY DON'T SUBSIDIZE THAT IN
- 15 ANY WAY IN THIS COUNTY AT THIS MOMENT. YOU KNOW, IT'S
- 16 SOMETHING WE OBVIOUSLY WOULD LIKE TO SEE THERE BEING FUNDING
- 17 FOR. WE DON'T THINK IT'S FOR EVERYONE, BUT WE DO THINK THERE
- 18 ARE SOME PEOPLE IN THEIR RECOVERY WHO WANT TO LIVE IN A SOBER
- 19 HOUSING ENVIRONMENT. AND THAT MAY BE PERMANENT HOUSING FOR TWO
- 20 YEARS, FIVE YEARS, AND 10 YEARS FOR SOME PEOPLE.

- 22 SUP. BARGER: AND THAT'S CONCERNING TO ME ONLY BECAUSE I KNOW
- 23 AT IMPACT, WHEN THEY HAVE TO RELEASE THESE -- THEIR CLIENTS
- 24 AFTER 30 DAYS, THEY WILL NOT MEET THE CRITERIA FOR MEDICAL,
- 25 BUT YET THEY STILLVERY MUCH NEED TO BE AROUND A PROGRAM THAT'S



- 1 GOING TO SUPPORT THEM. AND SO, THEY RUN A SOBER LIVING, AND
- 2 THEY SAID THE HARDEST PART IS SOBER LIVING -- IDENTIFYING BEDS
- 3 TO PLACE THEIR PATIENTS OR THEIR CLIENTS IN. AND THEIR FEAR IS
- 4 THAT THEY'RE SETTING THEM UP FOR FAILURE BECAUSE IF THEY
- 5 RELEASE THEM BACK OUT TO THE COMMUNITY WITHOUT THAT SUPPORT --

7 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: THIS WHAT IS WE USED TO CALL HALFWAY HOUSES?

8

- 9 SUP. BARGER: YEAH, I MEAN, NOT REALLY. I DON'T THINK THEY ARE
- 10 HALFWAY HOUSES.

11

- 12 DR. FERRER: THEY'RE NOT HALFWAY HOUSES BECAUSE MOST SOBER
- 13 LIVING ENVIRONMENTS DON'T HAVE LIKE FULL-TIME STAFF. LIKE A
- 14 HALFWAY HOUSE HAS TO HAVE FULL-TIME STAFF. I MEAN YOU HAVE A
- 15 WHOLE SUPPORT NETWORK IN THERE. SOBER LIVING, HOPEFULLY THERE
- 16 ARE SUPPORT SERVICES CLOSE BY, BUT THEY'RE OFTEN JUST FIVE
- 17 PEOPLE, WHO ARE COMMITTED TO SOBER LIVING, WHO WANT TO LIVE
- 18 TOGETHER TO SUPPORT EACH OTHER --

19

20 SUP. BARGER: AND THEY AGREE ON THE SOBRIETY.

- 22 DR. FERRER: AND THEY AGREE ON WHAT THAT ARRANGEMENT WILL LOOK
- 23 LIKE. THE BEST MODELS ARE THOSE THAT HAVE COORDINATORS, BUT
- 24 THEY'RE NOT LIKE HOUSE PARENTS OR HOUSE PEOPLE, WHO STAY IN
- 25 THE FACILITY IN MOST SOBER LIVING SITUATIONS. PEOPLE ARE



- 1 LIVING INDEPENDENTLY, AND THE COORDINATORS ARE TRYING TO MAKE
- 2 SURE THEY'RE STAYING WELL COORDINATED TO SUPPORT SERVICES. A
- 3 LOT OF IT FOR PEOPLE OBVIOUSLY WHO WANT -- ARE IN SOBER LIVING
- 4 IS MAKING SURE THEY KEEP THEIR JOBS, MAKING SURE THEY HAVE
- 5 THEIR HEALTHCARE, AND MAKING SURE WHATEVER THEIR RECOVERY
- 6 JOURNEY IS, IF THEY'RE ON A MAT PROGRAM, THAT THEY'RE ABLE TO
- 7 CONTINUE THAT PART OF THEIR RECOVERY PROGRAM, BUT IT'S NOT
- 8 LIKE SUPERVISED IN THE SAME WAY.

- 10 SUP. BARGER: AND IF WE DON'T CHANGE LAW, THEN I THINK IT'S
- 11 MORE IMPORTANT TO HAVE SOBER LIVING HOMES FOR INDIVIDUALS THAT
- 12 ARE STILL GOING TO BE, FOR EXAMPLE, I USE IMPACT BECAUSE I
- 13 WENT OUT THERE AND TALKED TO THEM -- THAT STILL CONNECTED TO
- 14 IMPACT, BUT NOW IT'S FREEING UP A BED AT IMPACT, EVEN THOUGH
- 15 THEY RATHER KEEP THEM AT THE FACILITY, THEY RECOGNIZE THAT,
- 16 BECAUSE OF THE WAY IT'S STRUCTURED, THEY CAN'T. THEY MOVE THEM
- 17 THERE, AND THEN THEY PROVIDE THE SUPPORTIVE SERVICES AROUND.
- 18 AND SO, IT'S INDEPENDENT LIVING, THOUGH. IT IS DEFINITELY
- 19 INDEPENDENT LIVING. SO, I JUST WANTED TO KNOW. SO, THAT'S NOT
- 20 ON HERE. AND THEN HOW THEN HOUSING FOR HEALTH? WOULD THAT FALL
- 21 UNDER THE PERMANENT HOUSING WITH SUPPORTIVE SERVICES?

- 23 DR. GHALY: IT FALLS UNDER BOTH INTERIM HOUSING AND THE
- 24 PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING CATEGORIES. D.H.S. OPERATES TWO
- 25 KINDS OF INTERIM HOUSING, BOTH STABILIZATION HOUSING, WHICH IS



- 1 A LOWER ACUITY SETTING, AND RECUPERATIVE CARE, WHICH IS A
- 2 HIGHER ACUITY SETTING. AND HOUSING FOR HEALTH AND THE OFFICE
- 3 OF DIVERSION AND REENTRY BOTH OPERATE ALL THREE TYPES:
- 4 STABILIZATION HOUSING, RECUPERATIVE CARE, AND PERMANENT
- 5 SUPPORTIVE HOUSING. SO BOTH O.D.R. AND HOUSING FOR HEALTH ARE
- 6 IN BOTH OF THOSE COLUMNS.

- 8 SUP. BARGER: GREAT. AND I REALLY DO THANK YOU FOR THIS, LISA.
- 9 I TALK TO PEOPLE, AND WHEN WE TALK ABOUT THE I.M.D. WAIVER,
- 10 AND THEY THINK IT'S JUST ABOUT HOSPITALIZATION, AND IT'S NOT.
- 11 THE I.M.D. WAIVER WILL FREE UP FUNDING FOR THE BOARD AND CARE.
- 12 IT WILL FREE UP ON THE HOUSING SIDE AS WELL BECAUSE NOT
- 13 EVERYONE IS GOING TO NEED TO BE HOSPITALIZED. AND I THINK IT'S
- 14 IMPORTANT TO RECOGNIZE THAT THERE ARE INDIVIDUALS THAT ARE
- 15 GOING TO NEED THAT SUPPORT, BUT THEY DON'T NEED A HOSPITAL
- 16 BED, BUT THEY NEED A BOARD AND CARE, WHERE THEY'LL GET
- 17 HOLISTIC SERVICES PROVIDED TO THEM SO THEY DON'T RECIDIVATE
- 18 BACK ONTO THE STREET.

- 20 DR. WONG: AND I THINK SOMETIMES, SUPERVISOR, WHAT PEOPLE DON'T
- 21 OFTEN REALIZE IS THAT DIFFERENT LEVELS OF CARE AREN'T JUST FOR
- 22 DIFFERENT POPULATIONS. WE HAVE PEOPLE WHO CROSS POPULATIONS,
- 23 YOU KNOW, PEOPLE WHO HAVE HEALTH NEEDS AS WELL AS SUBSTANCE
- 24 USE NEEDS AS WELL AS MENTAL HEALTH, AND AT ANY GIVEN TIME,
- 25 SOMEBODY COULD NEED DIFFERENT LEVELS OF THIS CARE. AND WE HOPE



- 1 AS THEY'RE ON THEIR RECOVERY JOURNEY, THEY WORK THEIR WAY
- 2 ACROSS THE RAINBOW OF HOUSING OPTIONS.

- 4 SUP. BARGER: GREAT. I'M DONE AFTER THIS, BUT CAN I JUST ASK
- 5 DR. FERRER, CAN YOU HAVE SOMEONE ON YOUR STAFF, IT WOULD BE
- 6 HELPFUL TO ME, AND I DON'T KNOW TO MY COLLEAGUES, SO WE CAN
- 7 BETTER UNDERSTAND WHEN WE PURCHASE BEDS, WHAT DOES THAT MEAN?
- 8 DOES THAT MEAN THOSE ARE THERE, OR ARE THEY GIVEN AWAY TO
- 9 SOMEONE ELSE BECAUSE WHEN WE TALK ABOUT PARITY WITH HEALTH
- 10 SERVICES AND ALL I JUST FEEL LIKE WE NEED TO ENSURE THE PARITY
- 11 ON THE ALCOHOL AND DRUG TREATMENT SIDE? AND IF WE'RE
- 12 PURCHASING THE BED, I WANT TO UNDERSTAND HOW THAT WORKS
- 13 BECAUSE I THINK WE COULD FILL EACH BED, BUT SOMETIMES THEY'RE
- 14 NOT AVAILABLE.

15

16 DR. FERRER: DID YOU WANT ME TO TALK NOW? OR YOU WANT ME TO --?

17

- 18 SUP. BARGER: NO, YOU CAN DO A REPORT BACK. I THINK IT'S MORE
- 19 COMPLICATED THAN I UNDERSTOOD --

- 21 DR. FERRER: IT'S COMPLICATED BECAUSE IT'S SORT OF AVERAGE
- 22 USAGE OF BEDS IS LIKE ON THE PURCHASING SIDE, BUT YOU'RE
- 23 ABSOLUTELY RIGHT. SOMETIMES, WE KNOW IF WE WERE -- I'M A
- 24 PROVIDER. I HAVE 100 BEDS, BUT I HAVE CONTRACT FOR 120 BEDS
- 25 BECAUSE I HAVE A CERTAIN VACANCY RATE, AND I'M BUILDING IN MY



- 1 ASSUMED VACANCY RATE INTO THOSE CONTRACTS. SO, BASICALLY, I'M
- 2 TELLING THE PEOPLE CONTRACTING WITH ME I CAN MEET YOUR NEEDS,
- 3 BUT HOW WOULD WE KNOW IF THEY SAY MY BEDS ARE FULL? HOW DO YOU
- 4 KNOW THEY'RE ALL FILLED WITH THE PEOPLE THAT WE PAID THE
- 5 CONTRACT FOR? AT THE END OF THE DAY, PROBABLY THE LARGER ISSUE
- 6 FOR US IS HAVE TO HAVE ENOUGH BEDS IN THE SYSTEM SO, AS
- 7 SUPERVISOR HAHN MENTIONED, IF PEOPLE NEED A BED, THEY GET A
- 8 BED, THAT WE'RE NOT -- IT'S NOT JUST AROUND THE MONEY, BUT
- 9 IT'S ALSO WE HAVE THE VOLUME OF -- WE HAVE THE NUMBER OF BEDS
- 10 THAT WE ACTUALLY NEED TO SERVE THE POPULATION. BUT I'M HAPPY
- 11 TO SORT OF OUTLINE HOW WE CONTRACT AND HOW OTHER PEOPLE ARE
- 12 CONTRACTING.

- 14 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: RIGHT. AND INCLUDE ALSO SOMETIMES WE GET
- 15 OUTBID FOR BEDS. THERE ARE OTHERS THAT WILLPURCHASE, SEEMS
- 16 LIKE, RIGHT OUT FROM UNDER US BEDS WE WERE COUNTING ON.

17

- 18 DR. WONG: ONE OF THE THINGS THE DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH
- 19 HAS DONE BECAUSE WE FACE THAT ISSUE ALL THE TIME ABOUT PEOPLE
- 20 OUTBIDDING OR COMPETING FOR THE SAME BEDS IS THERE ARE CERTAIN
- 21 NUMBER OF BEDS THAT WE CONTRACT FOR THAT WE PAY FOR WHETHER WE
- 22 FILL THEM OR NOT SO THE PROVIDER HOLDS THEM ASIDE FOR OUR
- 23 CLIENTS ONLY, ESPECIALLY FOR PRIORITY POPULATIONS OR
- 24 POPULATIONS OTHERWISE VERY DIFFICULT TO PLACE.



- 1 SUP. BARGER: IS IT ON A TIERED REIMBURSEMENT SO IF THE BED IS
- 2 EMPTY, THEY STILL GET PAID, BUT NOT AT THE LEVEL IF THERE WAS
- 3 SOMEONE OCCUPYING THAT --

5 DR. WONG: NO, THEY GET PAID --

6

7 SUP. BARGER: THEY GET THE FULL?

8

- 9 DR. WONG: UH HUH, THEY GET PAID THAT FULL AMOUNT. SO, WE WORK
- 10 VERY HARD TO MAKE SURE THOSE BEDS ARE FILLED.

11

12 SUP. BARGER: OKAY. THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

13

14 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR HORVATH.

- 16 SUP. HORVATH: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR: AND I WANT TO THANK YOU
- 17 ALSO FOR THIS PRESENTATION. I KNOW THERE IS A LOT OF
- 18 DISCUSSION AROUND THE NEED FOR BEDS, HOW MANY BEDS ARE
- 19 AVAILABLE, WHAT THE NUMBERS ARE. WE GET ASKED A LOT OF
- 20 QUESTIONS. SO I THINK THIS LEVEL SETS AS WE GET MORE INTO SOME
- 21 MORE OF THE SPECIFIC DATA IN FUTURE PRESENTATIONS. I
- 22 UNDERSTAND, AS I SAID, THIS WILL BE A FIRST IN A SERIES, BUT
- 23 IT IS ESSENTIAL FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PUBLIC AND TO BRING
- 24 TRANSPARENCY TO THE PROGRESS THAT WE'RE MAKING ON BRINGING OUR
- 25 BEDS ONLINE, WHAT KIND OF BEDS THEY ARE, WHAT OUR EXISTING



- 1 CAPACITY IS AS WAS ASKED WHERE THEY ARE, WHAT KIND OF BEDS, SO
- 2 WE'RE BETTER ABLE TO PREPARE IN SCALING UP IN A STRATEGIC,
- 3 EQUITABLE, AND EFFICIENT MANNER. AND IT IS PARTICULARLY
- 4 POWERFUL TO HAVE THIS CONVERSATION ABOUT HOUSING AND BEDS LED
- 5 BY OUR VERY POWERFUL PANEL OF WOMEN HERE, JUSTICE, CARE,
- 6 PUBLIC HEALTH, HEALTH SERVICES. THIS IS THE CONTEXT IN WHICH
- 7 WE ARE TALKING ABOUT HOUSING. I THINK IT'S VERY IMPORTANT,
- 8 WHEN WE TALK ABOUT OUR CARE FIRST MODEL, THAT WE REMEMBER THAT
- 9 HOUSING AND THESE RELATED SERVICES ARE ESSENTIAL TO JUSTICE,
- 10 TO PUBLIC HEALTH, AND TO KEEPING PEOPLE SAFE, EVEN MORE SO
- 11 THAN SOME OF THE THINGS WE MIGHT INITIALLY THINK OF IN THE
- 12 REALM OF PUBLIC SAFETY. SO, I THANK YOU FOR THE ROLE YOU'RE
- 13 PLAYING IN THAT. I WANT ALSO TO JUST FOR TRANSPARENCY IN THIS
- 14 CONVERSATION, OUR AGENDA ITEM SAYS IN THE BACKGROUND THAT THIS
- 15 DISCUSSION IS IN RESPONSE TO THE ALLIANCE LAWSUIT, BUT I
- 16 WANTTO BE VERY CLEAR THAT THIS CONVERSATION IS WORK THAT THE
- 17 COUNTY HAS BEEN DOING BEFORE THE ALLIANCE LAWSUIT, DURING THE
- 18 ALLIANCE LAWSUIT, WILL CONTINUE DO AFTER THE ALLIANCE LAWSUIT.
- 19 I WANT TO BE VERY CLEAR. I THINK THAT, DR. WONG, YOU MENTIONED
- 20 A NUMBER OF 1,000 BEDS. THAT'S A NUMBER THAT'S SPECIFIC TO A
- 21 VERY SPECIFIC SET OF CIRCUMSTANCES IDENTIFIED IN THE LAWSUIT,
- 22 BUT THERE IS A SEPARATE M.O.U. WITH THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES
- 23 THAT TALKS ABOUT BEDS AND SERVICES FOR OUR UNHOUSED RESIDENTS.
- 24 THERE ARE OTHER ONGOING EFFORTS. SO THAT NUMBER PEOPLE HAVE
- 25 TALKED A LOT ABOUT, BUT THERE'S LOT OF OTHER EFFORT THAT THE



- 1 COUNTY IS DOING THAT WILL BE REVEALED IN YOUR FUTURE
- 2 PRESENTATIONS AND THAT WE'RE EVEN SEEING REVEALED HERE TODAY
- 3 THAT THERE'S A LOT MORE WORK BEING DONE BEYOND I THINK WHAT
- 4 SOME OF THE TALKING POINTS I HAVE HEARD OUT IN THE WORLD. SO I
- 5 THINK THESE CONVERSATIONS ON AN ONGOING BASIS WILL HELP MAKE
- 6 THAT CLEARER TO PEOPLE. THERE IS A WHOLE WORLD OF WORK THAT'S
- 7 BEING DONE BY THE COUNTY IN THIS EFFORT. I ALSO WANT TO BE
- 8 CLEAR -- AND PLEASE CORRECT IF I'M GETTING ANY OF THIS WRONG -
- 9 THAT THE TERMS OF THE ALLIANCE LAWSUIT DO NOT LIMIT OUR
- 10 ABILITY. WE ARE NOT RESTRICTED TO A THOUSAND BEDS. THAT'S SORT
- 11 OF THE FLOOR. THAT'S NOWHERE NEAR THE CEILING. THAT WE HAVE
- 12 OTHER ACTIONS WE'LL BE TAKING. WE KNOW THE INTERVENERS, AS
- 13 PART OF THAT DISCUSSION, ASKED FOR PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT. HERE WE
- 14 ARE OUT IN THE PUBLIC HAVING THIS CONVERSATIONS SO OUR PUBLIC
- 15 CAN ENGAGE WITH US, AND I THINK THAT'S REALLY CRITICAL BECAUSE
- 16 I KNOW THE OTHER SETTLEMENT DIDN'T INCLUDE PUBLIC DISCUSSION,
- 17 BUT WE, AS A COUNTY, ARE TAKING IT UPON OURSELVES TO
- 18 CONTINUALLY HAVE THIS CONVERSATION WITH THE PUBLIC TO BE
- 19 ACCOUNTABLE NOT ONLY TO YOURSELVES AND AS DEPARTMENTS BUT WITH
- 20 THE PUBLIC IN WHAT KIND OF SERVICES WE'RE PROVIDING. SO I
- 21 THINK THIS IS A REALLY GREAT START. I KNOW THAT, AS YOU SAID,
- 22 YOU'LL BE BRINGING FORWARD FUTURE PRESENTATIONS, SO I'LL LEAVE
- 23 SOME OF THE DATA-SPECIFIC OUESTIONS TO THOSE FUTURE
- 24 PRESENTATIONS. I WOULD ONLY ADD TO THE REQUESTS OF MY
- 25 COLLEAGUES THAT YOU CONSIDER COMING UP WITH OR IDENTIFYING HOW



- 1 WE'RE LOOKING AT BEDS THAT ADDRESS BOTH SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER
- 2 AND MENTAL HEALTH AT THE SAME TIME BECAUSE WE KNOW THAT THERE
- 3 ARE A LOT OF NEEDS, AND WHEN WE START TO DIVIDE AND SILO WHAT
- 4 THESE BEDS ARE USED FOR AND UNDER WHOSE UMBRELLA THEY BELONG
- 5 THEN IT STARTS TO GET CONFUSING TO THE PUBLIC WELL, WHAT IS IT
- 6 FOR AND WHO IS -- WHEN WE TRY TO DRILL DOWN IN THE NUMBERS.
- 7 I'M HEARING FROM YOU THAT IT'S NOT AS CLEAR AS THAT. IT'S NOT
- 8 AS GRANULAR AS THAT, THAT WE HAVE TO THINK THROUGH THOSE
- 9 DIFFERENT LENSES AND HOW WE INTEGRATE THEM ALL TOGETHER, BUT I
- 10 JUST -- I'M TRYING TO BE OVERLY CLEAR SO THAT WAY ANYONE WHO
- 11 IS WATCHING OUR CONVERSATION UNDERSTANDS THAT THERE IS A LOT
- 12 GOING ON IN THESE NUMBERS AND THAT WE'LL CONTINUE TO ASK
- 13 OUESTIONS IN FUTURE PRESENTATIONS. I DO WANT TO ECHO OUR
- 14 CHAIR, THOUGH, BECAUSE I SHARE HER FRUSTRATION TO HEAR THAT IT
- 15 WILL TAKE A YEAR PLUS TO HAVE A WEBSITE THAT TRACKS BEDS. I
- 16 KNOW THAT WE HAVE THESE NUMBERS AVAILABLE. AND SO, WE'LL BE
- 17 HAVING THESE MEETINGS TO MAKE THOSE NUMBERS TRANSPARENT IN AN
- 18 ONGOING BASIS BEFORE THAT'S UP AND RUNNING, BUT I ALSO KNOW
- 19 THAT REGULAR PEOPLE WITH FAR FEWER RESOURCES THAN THIS COUNTY
- 20 HAVE THE ABILITY TO BRING THINGS ONLINE MUCH FASTER THAN A
- 21 YEAR PLUS, AND WE ARE A TIME OF EMERGENCY. THERE IS A SENSE OF
- 22 URGENCY FROM THE PUBLIC ON THIS TOPIC. AND SO, I JUST WANT TO
- 23 MAKE SURE WE'RE MOVING WITH EXPEDIENCY ON GETTING THAT DONE
- 24 BECAUSE THAT'S -- IT'S CRITICAL TO NOT ONLY HOLDING OURSELVES
- 25 ACCOUNTABLE BUT TO BEING HONEST AND ESTABLISHING PUBLIC TRUST



- 1 THAT WE'RE ACTUALLY DOING WHAT WE SAY WE'RE GOING TO DO. I
- 2 JUST WANT TO REITERATE THE CHAIR'S SENSE OF URGENCY ON THAT. I
- 3 THINK SHE WAS ENTIRELY SPOT ON. THANK YOU. AND I'M HAPPY TO
- 4 HEAR IF YOU HAVE A RESPONSE TO THAT.

- 6 JUDGE ARMSTEAD: THE C.E.O.'S OFFICE IS HELPING US SO THAT WE
- 7 CAN CONTRACT FASTER THAN WE WOULD NORMALLY BE ABLE TO DO
- 8 WITHIN OUR OWN DEPARTMENTS. THAT'S NUMBER ONE.NUMBER TWO, AS
- 9 PORTIONS OF IT BECOME AVAILABLE, WE'LL RELEASE IT, BUT THERE
- 10 ARE THINGS WE'LL NEED TO DO, AS YOU HEARD FROM EVERYONE.
- 11 PROVIDERS CONTRACT WITH MANY PEOPLE. SOMETIMES THEY GO TO THE
- 12 HIGHEST BIDDER. SO, IT MAY SAY IT'S AVAILABLE, AND IT'S NOT
- 13 AVAILABLE. SO, WE HAVE TO FIGURE OUT HOW TO WORK THROUGH ALL
- 14 OF THOSE THINGS CONTRACTUALLY. THE CHART THAT YOU SAW, IT TOOK
- 15 US NINE MONTHS FOR ALL DEPARTMENTS TO AGREE TO MAKE SOMETHING
- 16 LIKE THAT AS A CHART. WE HAVE TO AGREE ON WHAT THE IN-TAKE
- 17 FORM LOOKS LIKE. SO THERE ARE PORTIONS THAT CAN BE RELEASE AS
- 18 THEY BECOME AVAILABLE, BUT I DON'T WANT TO SAY THAT WE'LL HAVE
- 19 IT DONE IN THREE MONTHS AND WE WON'T, SO I'LL JUST SAY A YEAR
- 20 ON THE FAR END. AND AS WE ARE ABLE TO UPDATE, WE'LL LET YOU
- 21 KNOW THE STATUS EACH TIME, IF THAT'S OKAY.

- 23 SUP. HORVATH: I'M CLEAR. AND I THINK WHAT YOU'LL HEAR IN
- 24 RESPONSE IS JUST THE FRUSTRATION OF BUREAUCRACY TAKING NINE
- 25 MONTHS TO GET CLEAR ANSWERS ON THINGS THAT ARE ESSENTIAL TO



- 1 KNOW ON A DAILY BASIS. I UNDERSTAND YOU'RE BEING REAL ABOUT
- 2 WHAT ROADBLOCKS YOU'RE UP AGAINST. AND I'M ASKING THAT IN ANY
- 3 WAY, UNDER THE STATE OF EMERGENCY THAT WE ARE IN, THAT WE
- 4 REMOVE ANY OF THOSE ROADBLOCKS TO MOVE FASTER AND TO BE ABLE
- 5 TO RESPOND IN AS REAL-TIME AS WE CAN.

7 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR MITCHELL.

- 9 SUP. MITCHELL: THANK YOU. I APPRECIATE THAT. JUST -- WELL,
- 10 FIRST OF ALL, I UNDERSTAND FROM THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE THAT I
- 11 NEED TO RESTATE WHAT I THOUGHT I SAID PREVIOUSLY, WHICH IS I
- 12 AM REQUESTING THAT AFTER MAY 16TH, WE GET QUARTERLY UPDATES ON

- 24 SUP. MITCHELL: LIKE YESTERDAY. THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR HAHN.
- 25 ANOTHER ASSIST. I APPRECIATE YOU. THE LAKERS ARE GOING TO



- 1 RECRUIT YOU AND I. GETTING BACK TO THIS ISSUE, GOVERNMENT GETS
- 2 IN OUR OWN WAY BECAUSE WE DO HAVE REQUIREMENTS. SOMETIMES, THE
- 3 REQUIREMENTS ARE BASED ON OUR FUNDERS. AND DATA SYSTEMS ARE
- 4 WHERE GOVERNMENT FAILS HUGELY. THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA, THE 10
- 5 YEARS I WAS THERE, NEVER GOT ONLINE A NEW DATA SYSTEM FOR THE
- 6 COURTS, FOR D.C.F.S. TO MERGE. GOVERNMENT DOESN'T DO WELL.
- 7 PRIVATE SECTOR COULD DO WELL BECAUSE THEY DON'T HAVE TO WORRY
- 8 ABOUT MULTIPLE FUNDING REOUIREMENTS AND GETTING THE LOWEST
- 9 BIDDER. LOWEST BIDDER, JUNK IN AND JUNK OUT. WHY WOULD WE
- 10 EXPECT SOMETHING TO WORK IF WE WENT THE CHEAP ROUTE? SPEAKING
- 11 OF THE CHEAP ROUTE, I WANT TO MAKE SURE WE HAVE IN A BUDGET,
- 12 EITHER CURRENT FISCAL YEAR OR NEXT FISCAL YEAR, THE FUNDING TO
- 13 ALLOW YOU TO DO THAT WORK. IS THAT FUNDED CURRENT FISCAL YEAR,
- 14 OR WILL I SEE IN THE UPCOMING BUDGET?

- 16 JUDGE ARMSTEAD: WE'RE PIECEMEAL-ING IT TOGETHER. WE ARE USING
- 17 SOME FUNDS FROM C.F.C.I. WE ARE USING SOME OLD A.T.I. DOLLARS,
- 18 AND WE'RE WORKING WITH THE COURTS TO ALSO USE OF THEIR S.B.
- 19 129. SO, WE'RE PIECEMEAL-ING IT TOGETHER.

- 21 SUP. MITCHELL: DO YOU HAVE AN ADEQUATE FUNDING BASE TO DELIVER
- 22 ON WHAT BOARD MEMBERS CLEARLY ARE EXPECTING IN TERMS OF THIS
- 23 SINGULAR PORTAL WHERE ANYBODY CAN GO TO FIND OUT WHAT KIND OF
- 24 BED IS AVAILABLE AND WHERE?



- 1 JUDGE ARMSTEAD: NOT BASED ON THE VENDORS CURRENTLY WHAT WE
- 2 PREDICTED, NO, BUT WE'RE WORKING ON IT.

- 4 SUP. MITCHELL: I THINK THAT'S IMPORTANT FOR US TO KNOW AS WE
- 5 CONTINUE OUR BUDGET DELIBERATIONS AND MAKE DECISIONS AROUND
- 6 BUDGET PRIORITIES. LAST PIECE -- I THINK IT'S ALSO IMPORTANT
- 7 FOR US TO REMEMBER, AS I LISTEN TO THE CONVERSATION, WE'RE
- 8 TALKING ABOUT COUNTY BEDS, BUT THERE ARE PRIVATE INSURANCE
- 9 HAVE BEDS, MEDI-CAL AND OTHER INSURERS HAVE BEDS. AND SO,
- 10 THAT'S WHEN YOU TALK ABOUT US COMPETING AND THE NOTION
- 11 OFHAVING TO PAY FOR A BED THAT'S EMPTY, I GET, BECAUSE
- 12 TOMORROW, WE MAY NEED IT. AND I THINK WE DO HAVE TO PAY FOR
- 13 THE FULL COST OF THE BED BECAUSE IT'S NOT JUST A BED, IT'S
- 14 ALLTHE SUPPORT SERVICES. AND WE NEED TO MAINTAIN ALL THOSE
- 15 SUPPORT SERVICES IN CASE, AT 10:00 A.M., WE DIDN'T NEED THE
- 16 BED, BUT AT MIDNIGHT, WE DO. SO, IT GIVES US A LITTLE
- 17 HEARTBURN, BUT I GET WHY IT'S NECESSARY SO WHEN WE ACTIVATE
- 18 THAT BED, IT'S AVAILABLE WITH ALL THE SUPPORT SERVICES THAT
- 19 ARE NECESSARY TO MAKE THAT BED TRULY A SUCCESSFUL PLACEMENT
- 20 FOR THAT COUNTY RESIDENT. THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

- 22 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: OKAY. I'M GOING TO CLARIFY -- YOU MAY HAVE
- 23 TO SAY IT THREE TIMES. SO, I THINK THEY WANT US TO CLARIFY
- 24 THAT YOUR QUARTERLY REPORTS WOULD BE SET MATTERS OR JUST A

- 6 ON -- SO YOU NEED TO MOVE IT --

- 8 SUP. MITCHELL: MADAM CHAIR, I MAKE A MOTION THAT WE ESTABLISH
- 9 A SET MATTER, A QUARTERLY SET MATTER AGENDA, FOR THE REPORT
- 10 BACK ON THE CONTINUUM OF CARE BEDS.

- 12 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: I WILL SECOND THAT. AND WHEN DO WE TAKE THAT
- 13 UP FOR A VOTE?

- 15 CELIA ZAVALA, E.O.: WE CAN TAKE IT UP AFTER THE MEMBERS OF THE

- 7 SUP. SOLIS: JUST ONE COMMENT. I KNOW, DR. GHALY, YOU'RE
- 8 HEAVILY ENGAGED IN THIS. AND THIS HAS TO DO WITH L.A. CARE AND
- 9 THE CAL-AIM PROGRAM AND FUNDING THAT WILL ALSO HELP US
- 10 ESTABLISH MORE SERVICES. I DON'T KNOW ABOUT CAPITAL. WE'RE
- 11 HEARING FROM SACRAMENTO THAT WE MIGHT BE ABLE TO USE IT TO
- 12 BUILD FACILITIES TOO, THOSE BEDS. CAN YOU TOUCH BASE ON THAT A
- 13 LITTLE BIT. THAT'S ADDITIONAL FUNDING WE'LL BE ABLE TO
- 14 RECEIVE.

- 16 DR. GHALY: SORRY, SUPERVISOR. WAS THE QUESTION ABOUT CAL-AIM
- 17 REVENUE?

18

19 SUP. SOLIS: YES.

- 21 DR. GHALY: SO, CAL-AIM, THROUGH ITS COMMUNITY SUPPORTS ARM
- 22 DOES PROVIDE SOME LEVEL OF REIMBURSEMENT FOR A FEW OF THE

- 24 REIMBURSEMENT, FOR EXAMPLE, RECUPERATIVE CARE, WHICH IS ONE OF
- 25 THE LEVELS OF INTERIM HOUSING, PROVIDES REIMBURSEMENT FOR



- 1 THINGS SUCH AS TENANCY SUPPORT SERVICES, HOUSING NAVIGATION
- 2 SERVICES, WHICH ARE CERTAIN SERVICE ELEMENTS OF WHAT SOMEONE
- 3 NEEDS TO BE ABLE TO TRANSITION INTO HOUSING OR ULTIMATELY INTO
- 4 PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING. THERE ARE ALSO ELEMENTS OF CAL-
- 5 AIM THAT HAVEN'T HAVEN'T BEEN IMPLEMENTED UNIFORMLY BY ALL OF
- 6 THE HEALTH PLANS THAT PROVIDES TEMPORARY RENTAL ASSISTANCE FOR
- 7 A PERIOD OF TIME, AND I UNDERSTAND THERE IS ALSO ADDITIONAL
- 8 BILLS BEING ENTERTAINED IN A VARIETY OF LEGISLATIVE AREAS THAT
- 9 WOULD EXTEND AN ADDITIONAL NUMBER OF MONTHS OF RENT. OVERALL,
- 10 WHAT WE'VE SEEN SO FAR IN CAL-AIM, AND I WOULD SAY IT'S STILL
- 11 FAIRLY EARLY IN THE PROGRAM, IS THAT THE REVENUE THAT'S
- 12 AVAILABLE THROUGH CAL-AIM IS NOT SUFFICIENT TO COVER THE COSTS
- 13 OF PROVIDING THOSE SERVICES. SO, SO FAR, FOR D.H.S., AND I'LL
- 14 LET THE OTHER DEPARTMENTS SPEAK SEPARATELY, OUR COSTS ARE FAR
- 15 EXCEED THE THE REVENUE THATWE'RE ABLE TO PULL IN THROUGH THE
- 16 HEALTH PLANS. WE HAVE CONTRACTS WITH ALL THE HEALTH PLANS FOR
- 17 ALL OF THE COMMUNITY SUPPORTS THAT ARE OFFERED, THOUGH THE
- 18 OFFERING -- IT'S NOT AN ENTITLEMENT BENEFIT UNDER MEDICAID, SO
- 19 HEALTH PLANS HAVE AN OPTION OF OFFERING WHICHEVER
- 20 CONSTELLATION OF COMMUNITY SUPPORT SERVICES THEY WISH. AND AS
- 21 PART OF THAT, THEY CAN ALSO HAVE SOME DEGREE OF DISCRETION
- 22 ABOUT THEIR ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA. THIS IS WHERE, FOR EXAMPLE,
- 23 ON RECUPERATIVE CARE, WE STILL HAVE A LOT OF CHALLENGES, WHERE
- 24 HEALTH PLANS WILL SET UP CHALLENGES AND BARRIERS WITH BEING
- 25 ABLE TO HAVE PATIENTS ACCESS IN A TIMELY MANNER RECUPERATIVE



- 1 CARE LEVEL SERVICES, OR THEY WON'T APPROVE THE FULL NUMBER OF
- 2 DAYS THAT ANINDIVIDUAL NEEDS. THESE ARE SOME OF THE CHALLENGES
- 3 THAT WE'RE, AS WELL AS MANY OTHER PROVIDERS, ARE CONTINUING TO
- 4 WORK THROUGH AS CAL-AIM TRIES TO ENTER OUT OF ITS INFANCY INTO
- 5 A SUSTAINABLE PROGRAM. SO, IT REMAINS TO BE SEEN HOW MUCH NET
- 6 REVENUE IS ABLE BE PULLED IN, BUT SO FAR, TO DATE, IT'S, AS I
- 7 MENTIONED, NOT SUFFICIENT TO COVER COSTS.

- 9 SUP. SOLIS: SO, I THINK OUR BOARD WILL TRY TO STAY ON TOP OF
- 10 THAT TOO BECAUSE, OBVIOUSLY, WE WANT TO TRY TO LEVERAGE AS
- 11 MUCH AS WE CAN, AND I KNOW WE'RE IN DISCUSSIONS WITH L.A. CARE
- 12 AND HOPEFULLY SOME OTHER PROVIDERS, TOO. I THINK THAT'S THE
- 13 INITIATIVE THAT THE GOVERNOR WANTED TO SEE US TO TAKE. WHETHER
- 14 IT'S SUFFICIENT OR NOT, I'M NOT CLEAR TOTALLY, BUT I THINK
- 15 WHATEVER WE CAN DRAW DOWN TO HELP WITH ALL THE SERVICES WE
- 16 NEED, WE NEED TO BE THERE, AND OF COURSE WE'LL WORK WITH YOU
- 17 ALL ON THAT. THANK YOU.

18

- 19 DR. GHALY: ABSOLUTELY. AND CERTAINLY, SOME REVENUE IS BETTER
- 20 THAN NO REVENUE, SO IT'S HELPFUL TO BE ABLE TO BRING IN SOME
- 21 REVENUE, BUT RIGHT NOW, TO BE ABLE TO SUSTAIN THE PROGRAMS, WE
- 22 STILL NEED SUPPLEMENTAL REVENUE SOURCES, WHETHER IT'S MEASURE
- 23 H OR OTHERWISE, TO BE ABLE TO CONTINUE THOSE PROGRAMS.



- 1 DR. FERRER: IT'S IMPORTANT TO NOTE THAT WE ALL HAVE TO GET
- 2 INTO AGREEMENTS WITH THE HEALTH PLANS TO BE ABLE TO HAVE OUR
- 3 SERVICES COVERED BY THE HEALTH PLANS. THAT PART ISN'T
- 4 AUTOMATIC, EITHER. I MEAN, WE'VE BEEN NEGOTIATING, AND I WANT
- 5 TO SAY SUCCESSFULLY, BUT FOR MONTHS AND MONTHS AND MONTHS TO
- 6 BE ABLE TO ENTER INTO AGREEMENTS WITH THE HEALTH PLANS HERE SO
- 7 THAT SOME OF OUR SERVICES CAN, IN FACT, GET REIMBURSED. AND
- 8 THIS IS THE ONE PLACE WHERE REDEFINING WHAT'S MEDICALLY
- 9 NECESSARY SO THAT RECOVERY BRIDGE HOUSING, FOR EXAMPLE, CAN
- 10 GET PAID FOR WOULD BE SUPER IMPORTANT. THERE IS A VERY -- THE
- 11 IDEA THAT UNHOUSED PEOPLE WHO ARE NOT WELL DON'T NEED, AS PART
- 12 OF THEIR MEDICAL TREATMENT, SOME KIND OF STABLE HOUSING SEEMS
- 13 A LITTLE BIT DIFFICULT TO UNDERSTAND AS WELL. AND THOSE ARE
- 14 THE KINDS OF SERVICES WE WOULD HOPE WE COULD PAY FOR WITH A
- 15 CAL-AIM. I THINK THAT WAS THE INTENT THAT WE WOULD BE ABLE TO
- 16 COVER THOSE SERVICES WITH CAL-AIM, BUT I WOULD AGREE WITH
- 17 CHRISTINA. IT'S NOT BEEN FOR US EITHER REALLY STRAIGHTFORWARD
- 18 OR EASY. I DO WANT TO THANK THE HEALTH PLANS THAT ARE WORKING
- 19 WITH US, BUT IT'S BEEN A VERY LONG PROCESS.

- 3 THE SERVICES AND DEVELOP SOME OF THESE BETTER PROGRAMS. THANK
- 4 YOU.

- 3 MITCHELL. FOR MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC ON THE TELEPHONE, PLEASE
- 4 PRESS 1 AND THEN 0 NOW TO COMMENT ON THIS ITEM. SUPERVISOR
- 5 MITCHELL, WOULD YOU LIKE TO KICK IT OFF?

- 7 SUP. MITCHELL: THANK YOU SO MUCH, MADAM CHAIR. I WILL. FOR
- 8 SOME TIME, THE MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. COMMUNITY HOSPITAL HAS
- 9 BEEN IN URGENT NEED OF MORE SPACE. THE CURRENT PATIENT LOADS
- 10 FAR EXCEED THE COUNTY'S ORIGINAL PROJECTIONS WHEN THE HOSPITAL
- 11 WAS FIRST DESIGNED AND BUILT. THE HOSPITAL'S EMERGENCY
- 12 DEPARTMENT, ORIGINALLY DESIGNED TO TREAT LESS THAN 100
- 13 PATIENTS PER DAY, CONSISTENTLY POST-COVID AVERAGES MORE THAN
- 14 300 PATIENTS PER DAY. WHY IS THAT RELEVANT TO US? PRIMARILY
- 15 BECAUSE A SIGNIFICANT NUMBER, UPWARDS OF 12,000 LAST YEAR,
- 16 WERE D.H.S. SERVICES ASSIGNED PATIENTS THAT RECEIVED THEIR
- 17 TREATMENT IN THE EMERGENCY ROOM. SO I WANT TO THANK THE
- 18 DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH, THE COUNTY COUNSEL, AND THE
- 19 C.E.O. REAL ESTATE DIVISION FOR THEIR WORK TO GRANT ACCESS FOR
- 20 MORE SPACE FOR THE HOSPITAL IN THE BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CENTER IN
- 21 EXCHANGE FOR THE HOSPITAL'S PROVISION OF EMERGENCY TRANSPORT

- 2 MONITOR WHAT WE CALL THE RED GURNEY LICENSING AGREEMENT TO
- 3 MAKE SURE IT'S MUTUALLY BENEFICIAL FOR BOTH PARTIES AS HOPED.
- 4 I ASK FOR AN AYE VOTE.

6 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR HORVATH?

- 8 SUP. HORVATH: THANK YOU, AND I WANT TO THANK SUPERVISOR
- 9 MITCHELL FOR BRINGING THIS MOTION THIS FORWARD. I'M PLEASED TO
- 10 SEE THERE IS A CREATIVE SOLUTION TO UTILIZING SPACE THAT HAS
- 11 BEEN VACANT FOR YEARS. THIS IS A WIN-WIN FOR EVERYONE. THE
- 12 COMMUNITY M.L.K. HOSPITAL WILL INCREASE IN-PATIENT BED
- 13 CAPACITY BY 10. THIS WILL SERVE THE COMMUNITIES BY PROVIDING
- 14 MORE CAPACITY TO A HOSPITAL THAT IS AVERAGING MORE THAN 300
- 15 PATIENTS PER DAY IN THE EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT ALONE WHEN THE
- 16 SITE WAS DESIGNED TO TREAT LESS THAN, FEWER THAN, 100 PATIENT
- 17 AS DAY. ADDITIONALLY, COMMUNITIES AROUND OUR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH
- 18 CENTER WILL HAVE A RED GURNEY TEAM AVAILABLE 24/7 CONSISTING
- 19 OF A REGISTERED NURSE, AN EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIAN, AND

- 21 WANTED TO HIGHLIGHT THIS IS A GREAT EXAMPLE OF COLLABORATION,

- 18 THE FAMILY OF MARTIN LUTHER KING OR SOME IMPOSTER SHOWED UP
- 19 AND SAID I'M MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. AND SAID I GET MY OWN
- 20 APARTMENT BUILDING OVER THERE AND STUFF. THERE IS A BUNCH OF
- 21 PEOPLE INVOLVED IN A DEVELOPMENT OF A MARTIN LUTHER KING
- 22 HOSPITAL OVER THERE THAT ARE INVOLVED IN OTHER ILLEGAL REAL
- 23 ESTATE DEVELOPMENT. THERE ARE ILLEGAL HOUSING TRACTS AND

- 3 HEALTH AT MARTIN LUTHER KING HOSPITAL. THAT'S IT.

- 19 CHILDREN'S COMMISSION, FOR HER HARD WORK IN MINING THE DATA TO
- 20 HELP US BETTER UNDERSTAND HOW THE MANDATED REPORTING
- 21 INFRASTRUCTURE IS A HUGE DRIVER OF THAT SYSTEM. AND THE DATA

- 5 THESE INTERACTIONS. WE HAVE AN OPPORTUNITY TO TRANSFORM THIS
- 6 PRACTICE IN A BIG WAY WITH THIS WORK. AND A HUGE PART OF THE
- 7 SUCCESS OF THE INITIATIVE WILL BE LEGISLATION AT THE STATE
- 8 LEVEL THAT DEALS WITH THE THREAT OF PROSECUTION, JOB LOSS, AND

- 13 FAMILIES BETTER REQUIRING THAT ASSISTANCE. AND WE HEARD LAST
- 14 YEAR THERE WAS A SITUATION BECAUSE OF LANGUAGE DIFFICULTY, AND
- 15 THE FAMILY IMPACTED HAD A CHILD REMOVED UNNECESSARILY, AND
- 16 THINGS HAPPEN WHEN YOU ARE NOT HAVING CAPABLE STAFF THAT
- 17 REALLY UNDERSTAND THE COMMUNITIES OR UNDERSTAND AT LEASTWHAT
- 18 SIGNS ARE THERE TO ASK FOR HELP. AND THAT HAPPENS IN MANY
- 19 IMMIGRANT COMMUNITIES, AND LANGUAGE BARRIERS EXIST. WE KNOW
- 20 THAT. SO I THINK WILL GO IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION TO HELP US
- 21 MEET THAT NEED AND HELP BRING ON THOSE COMPETENT STAKEHOLDERS

- 23 OF THE NEED FOR THIS AND SUPPORT IT. THANK YOU.

- 7 STORIES, IT'S A FACT. GROWN ADULTS [EXPLETIVE] CHILDREN.

9 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: NEXT SPEAKER, PLEASE.

- 11 EDEN AMARATTO: HI, MY NAME IS EDEN AMARATTO. I THINK THIS IS
- 12 GREAT. I SPOKE -- WE HELP STREET VENDOR VICTIMS, AND THERE WAS
- 13 A STREET VENDOR THAT HAD HER SON TAKEN AWAY, SAME THING,
- 14 BECAUSE THERE WAS A LANGUAGE BARRIER, BUT ALSO OTHER PEOPLE

- 8 ASSEMBLY BILL 12, RENTAL DEPOSIT FAIRNESS, WHICH WAS HELD BY
- 9 SUPERVISOR HORVATH. FOR MEMBERS ON THE TELEPHONE PLEASE PRESS
- 10 1 THEN 0 NOW TO COMMENT ON THIS ITEM. SUPERVISOR HORVATH,
- 11 WOULD YOU LIKE TO MAKE SOME REMARKS?

- 13 SUP. HORVATH: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. AS WE KNOW, FINDING
- 14 HOUSING IS INCREDIBLY CHALLENGING IN THE COMPETITIVE RENTAL
- 15 MARKET OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. AFFORDING RENT CAN BE
- 16 PROHIBITIVE FOR MANY INDIVIDUALS TO SAY THE LEAST. AND EVEN
- 17 WHEN SOMEONE FINDS THE PERFECT UNIT THAT THEY CAN AFFORD, THEY
- 18 MUST PROVIDE THOUSANDS AND THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS TO THE OWNER
- 19 IN ORDER TO MOVE IN, CREATING THE MOST SUBSTANTIAL BARRIER TO
- 20 HOUSING FOR MANY RESIDENTS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. THIS
- 21 HAPPENED TO ME JUST A COUPLE OF YEARS AGO, WHERE I FOUND THE
- 22 PERFECT PLACE TO MOVE IN, A PLACE I COULD AFFORD, BUT BECAUSE
- 23 I WAS ASKED TO PLAY NEARLY HALF A YEAR'S RENT UPFRONT IN ORDER
- 24 TO GET INTOA UNIT, IT WAS A PLACE I, ULTIMATELY, COULDN'T
- 25 LIVE. AS SOMEONE WITH A WELL- PAYING JOB, MAKING MORE THAN THE



- 1 MEDIAN INCOME OF THE COUNTY, IT WAS DIFFICULT FOR ME TO RENT A
- 2 NEW APARTMENT BECAUSE OF THE SUBSTANTIAL DEPOSITS THAT WERE
- 3 REQUIRED. THESE REGULATIONS ARE HURTING ANGELENOS DURING A
- 4 TIME OF HOUSING SHORTAGES AND SIGNIFICANT RENTAL RATE
- 5 INCREASES. MULTIPLE STATES HAVE ALREADY TACKLED THIS ISSUE OF
- 6 HIGH SECURITY DEPOSITS. CALIFORNIA CANNOT FALL BEHIND. A.B.12
- 7 PROHIBITS PROPERTY OWNERS FROM COLLECTING MORE THAN ONE
- 8 MONTH'S RENT AS THE SECURITY DEPOSIT NECESSARY IN ORDER TO
- 9 MOVE INTO A UNIT. THE BILL WILL AFFORD MILLIONS OF ANGELENOS
- 10 THE ABILITY TO AFFORD OR MOVE TO NEW APARTMENTS. I BELIEVE
- 11 THIS CRITICAL LEGISLATION IN TODAY'S LANDSCAPE OF EVER-
- 12 INCREASING RENTS IS ESSENTIAL, AND TAKING A POSITION ON THIS
- 13 BILL WILL HELP US LEAD IN THE CONVERSATION TO CREATE HOUSING
- 14 EQUITY TO CREATE MORE OPPORTUNITIES TO GET PEOPLE INTO HOUSING
- 15 THEY MIGHT OTHERWISE BE ABLE TO AFFORD. SO I DON'T WANT TO SEE
- 16 US WAIT TO WEIGH IN ON THIS ONE, AND I HOPE MY COLLEAGUES WILL
- 17 CONSIDER SUPPORTING IT. THANK YOU.

19 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: SUPERVISOR SOLIS?

- 21 SUP. SOLIS: THANK YOU, MADAM CHAIR. AND THANK YOU, SUPERVISOR
- 22 HORVATH, FOR BRINGING THE MOTION BEFORE US TODAY. WE, AS A
- 23 BOARD, HAVE BEEN ADVOCATING FOR EQUITABLE AND MULTI-PRONG
- 24 APPROACHES TO ADDRESS HOUSING AND SECURITY. IT'S ASTOUNDING TO
- 25 KNOW THAT THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA HAS BEEN BEHIND ON LIMITING



- 1 THE AMOUNT THAT COULD BE CHARGED BY A LANDLORD FOR A SECURITY
- 2 DEPOSIT TO ONE MONTH'S RENT, ALIGNED WITH ABOUT A DOZEN OTHER
- 3 STATES. IT'S HARD TO HEAR DATA INDICATING THAT IN CALIFORNIA,
- 4 APPROXIMATELY 53% OF THE FAMILIES HAVE BEEN KEPT FROM SECURING
- 5 AN APARTMENT, NOT BECAUSE OF THEIR INABILITY TO AFFORD THE
- 6 MONTHLY RENT, BUT BECAUSE THEY CAN'T AFFORD THE SECURITY
- 7 DEPOSIT. CURRENTLY, IN CALIFORNIA, THE SECURITY DEPOSIT COULD
- 8 BE UP TO TWICE THE MONTHLY RENT ABOUT FOR AN UNFURNISHED UNIT,
- 9 AND UP TO THREE TIMES THE MONTHLY RENT AMOUNT FOR A FURNISHED
- 10 UNIT. THE STATE'S CURRENT SECURITY DEPOSIT LAW ADDS TO THE
- 11 STRESSORS IMPACTING OUR VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES, MANY OF WHOM
- 12 WE HEARD COME BEFORE THE BOARD. WITH THE MONTHLY RENTS RISING,
- 13 THE SECURITY DEPOSITS ALSO RISE, AND THAT FURTHER LIMITS
- 14 FINDING ACCESSIBLE HOUSING IN AREAS OF HIGH HOUSING DEMAND,
- 15 MUCH OF WHOM WE REPRESENT. FORTUNATELY, HOUSING STABILIZATION
- 16 POLICIES CAN HELP SAFEGUARD AFFORDABILITY AND PREVENT
- 17 DISPLACEMENT FOR MANY OF OUR FAMILIES. SUPPORTING THIS BILL
- 18 WOULD LIMIT THE AMOUNT THAT A LANDLORD CAN COLLECT FOR A
- 19 SECURITY DEPOSIT TO ONE MONTH'S RENT, WHICH WILL HELP MAKE
- 20 HOUSING MORE ACCESSIBLE AND HELP PREVENT WORSENING OUR
- 21 HOMELESSNESS CRISIS. I DO SUPPORT THE LEGISLATION. THANK YOU.
- 23 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR MITCHELL?



- 1 SUP. MITCHELL: THANK YOU VERY MUCH, MADAM CHAIR. HAVING
- 2 REVIEWED BOTH THE STATE ASSEMBLY FLOOR ANALYSIS AND THE
- 3 ASSEMBLY JUDICIAL COMMITTEE ANALYSIS, AND I WANT TO THANK OUR
- 4 LEGTEAM FOR DOING THE ANALYSIS ON THE BILL LAST NIGHT, AS
- 5 WELL. I'M HAPPY TO SUPPORT THE BILL HAVING BEEN ABLE TO LOOK
- 6 AT WHERE IT IS IN THE PROCESS. I ACTUALLY VOTED ON A VERY
- 7 SIMILAR BILL BACK IN 2019, A BILL THAT CAPPED HOUSING RENTAL
- 8 DEPOSITS TO ONE MONTH FORSERVICE PEOPLE. SO I'M GLAD TO
- 9 SEECALIFORNIA WILL NOW BECOME THE 12TH STATE TO DO THE SAME
- 10 THING, PARTICULARLY GIVEN THAT WE ARE A VERY HIGH RENT STATE.
- 11 SO I'LL BE SUPPORTING THIS AND JUST ASK THAT, AS WE GO FORWARD
- 12 IN THE PROCESS, SINCE THE BILL IS STILL IN ITS HOUSE OF
- 13 ORIGIN, THAT WE TRACK IT, THAT OUR LEG TEAM TRACK IT, TO MAKE
- 14 SURE THAT THEAMENDMENTS THAT MAY BE TAKEN AS IT GOES THROUGH
- 15 THE SECOND HOUSE REMAIN WITHIN THE SPIRIT OF THE VERSION OF
- 16 THE BILL THAT WE ARE VOTING TO SUPPORT TODAY. THANK YOU, MADAM
- 17 CHAIR.

- 21 SUP. BARGER: THANK YOU. I WANT TO UNDERSTAND. I'M LOOKING AT
- 22 THE ANALYSIS, AND IT SAYS THE CURRENT LAW SETS THE MAX
- 23 SECURITY DEPOSIT FOR RESIDENT TENANTS TO EQUAL NO MORE THAN
- 24 TWO MONTHS FOR UNFURNISHED AND OF THREE MONTHS FOR FURNISHED

- 24 IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES. A COTTAGE FOOD OPERATOR THAT IS
- 25 REGISTERED WITH THE COUNTY IS ABLE TO SELL UP TO 25 SQUARE



- 1 FEET OF THEIR PRODUCTS WITHOUT A PERMIT AND IS LIMITED TO
- 2 \$50,000 IN ANNUAL GROSS SALES. S.B.972 ADDED OPPORTUNITIES FOR
- 3 SALES FROM COTTAGE FOOD OPERATORS TO SELL THROUGH A C.F.M.O.
- 4 IF A COTTAGE FOOD OPERATOR HAS A PERMIT ISSUED BY THE COUNTY
- 5 THEY'RE ABLE TO SELL THEIR PRODUCTS ON A C.M.F.O. THE SALES DO
- 6 NOT COUNT TOWARD THE \$150,000 LIMIT. A COTTAGE FOOD OPERATOR

- 6 RIGHT. SO QUICKLY, I WANT TO TALK THROUGH HOW D.E.O. SUPPORTS
- 7 STREET VENDORS TODAY AND WHAT'S COMING UP. FIRST OF ALL, THE
- 8 DEPARTMENT SUPPORTS STREET VENDORS, INCLUDING ALL SMALL
- 9 BUSINESSES AND MICRO-BUSINESSES, ACROSS L.A. COUNTY THROUGH
- 10 OUR OFFICE OF SMALL BUSINESS. WE OFFER A ONE ON ONE CONCIERGE,
- 11 TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE LIKE LEGAL AID, CAPITAL ACCESS, AND GRANT
- 12 OPPORTUNITIES, CONTRACTING, AND CERTIFICATION PROGRAMS, AS

- 16 GOING TO BE MANUFACTURING AND DISTRIBUTING D.P.H. CODE
- 17 COMPLIANT CARDS FOR 200 VENDORS, POTENTIALLY A FEW MORE,
- 18 BECAUSE WE RECEIVED TRANCHE TWO DOLLARS, THANK TO YOU TO OUR
- 19 BOARD, AND WE'LL HAVE AN R.F.P. OUT THIS SPRING FOR
- 20 PROTOTYPES, AND THEN WE'LL HAVE A SERIES OF MILESTONES WITH
- 21 FULL CART DISTRIBUTION IN AUGUST OF 2024. AND LASTLY, AGAIN,
- 22 WE ARE WORKING WITH OUR DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH TO MAKE
- 23 SURE WE HAVE AN INTEGRATED EDUCATION AND OUTREACH CAMPAIGN
- 24 RELATED TO THE NEW HEALTH REQUIREMENTS AS PART OF S.B.972 BUT



- 1 ALSO MAKING SURE THAT WE ARE SUPPORTING OUR STREET VENDORS IN
- 2 THE RUN UP TO OUR NEW ORDINANCE. THANK YOU.-

- 4 SUP. BARGER: IS THAT IT? ON THE LEGISLATION, I HAVE HAD CITIES
- 5 THAT HAVE, AT LEAST I'M BEING TOLD, CONFISCATED -- CITIES ARE
- 6 NOT ALLOWED TO -- THE COUNTY STILL HAS THE OVER -- THE
- 7 UMBRELLA OF ALL FOOD VENDOR, OTHER THAN LONG BEACH
- 8 ANDPASADENA, CORRECT, AS IT RELATES TO HEALTH? I MEAN WHEN THE
- 9 CONFISCATE IT, IT'S USUALLY --

- 11 LIZA FRIAS: GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS LIZA FRIAS, AND I'M
- 12 DIRECTOR OF ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH. AND YES, CURRENTLY, THE
- 13 COUNTY HAS THE OVERARCHING AUTHORITY FOR ENFORCEMENT OF THE
- 14 CALIFORNIA RETAIL FOOD CODE. THERE ARE CITIES, WHO ARE
- 15 ACTUALLY NOW CHANGING THEIR ORDINANCES TO ALLOW THEM TO BE
- 16 ABLE TO IMPOUND FOOD BASED ON ENCROACHMENT VIOLATIONS TO THEIR
- 17 OWN CITY ORDINANCES.

19 SUP. BARGER: BUT NOT ON HEALTH.

- 21 LIZA FRIAS: EXACTLY. SO, CURRENTLY, PUBLIC HEALTH, AS A POLICY
- 22 MATTER, DOES NOT IMPOUND ANY EQUIPMENT. WE DO DISPOSE OF FOOD
- 23 AT THE TIME OF OUR INVESTIGATIONS, DUE TO CONCERNS WITH FOOD
- 24 NOT BEING PREPARED IN A SAFE MANNER.



- 1 SUP. BARGER: SO, WHEN CITIES WANT TO ESTABLISH A LIST OF
- 2 PROHIBITED ITEMS THAT'S AROUND FOOD, THAT'S PROHIBITED, AS
- 3 WELL?

- 5 LIZA FRIAS: THAT IS CORRECT. THEY CANNOT ENFORCE THE
- 6 CALIFORNIA RETAIL FOOD CODE. THEY CAN ONLY ENFORCE THEIR
- 7 ZONING ORDINANCES, THEIR STREET ORDINANCES THAT ARE SPECIFIC
- 8 TO THEIR ZONING LAWS OR THEIR PLANNING LAWS OR THEIR CODE
- 9 ENFORCEMENT LAWS.

10

- 11 SUP. BARGER: OKAY. AND THEN, KELLY, JUST OUT OF CURIOSITY, A
- 12 LOT OF THESE FOOD VENDORS MAYBE DON'T HAVE ACCESS TO THE
- 13 METHODS YOU'RE USING TO DO OUTREACH. ARE WE SENDING TEAMS OUT
- 14 TO WHERE THE FOOD VENDORS ARE TO LET THEM KNOW WHAT IS
- 15 AVAILABLE FOR THEM?

- 17 KELLY LOBIANCO: YES. WE ARE IN AN INCREASING WAY NOW, NOW THAT
- 18 WE HAVE CONTRACTED WITH OUR PARTNERS, INCLUSIVE ACTION,
- 19 C.P.C., AND OTHERS. OUR OFFICE OF SMALL BUSINESS IS DIRECTLY
- 20 GOING OUT TO AREAS WHERE THERE'S HIGH CONCENTRATION OF FOOD
- 21 VENDORS AND DOING BOTH CAR AND ON-FOOT CANVASSING TO
- 22 UNDERSTAND MORE ABOUT THE VOLUME AND TYPE OF VENDING THAT'S
- 23 HAPPENING IN THOSE AREAS. AND WE'RE ALSO MAKING SURE THAT
- 24 WE'RE GOING TO HOT SPOTS BASED ON COMPLAINTS COMING IN THROUGH



- 1 REFERRALS TO THE OFFICE OF SMALL BUSINESS OR THROUGH OUR BOARD
- 2 OR OUR AGENCY PARTNERS.

- 4 SUP. BARGER: SO WHEN SOMEONE CHARACTERIZES S.B.972 AS REMOVING
- 5 LOCAL CONTROL, WHICH WOULD MEAN FROM YOU ALL, ON ENFORCING
- 6 AGAINST ILLEGAL FOOD VENDORS, WOULD THAT BE AN ACCURATE
- 7 STATEMENT, OR DO YOU FEEL THAT YOU HAVE LOST LOCAL CONTROL
- 8 OVER FOOD VENDORS?

- 10 DR. QUICK: S.B.972 DID NOT ALLOW US TO LOSE LOCAL CONTROL.
- 11 WHAT IT DID, ACTUALLY, IS REDUCE THE STRUCTURAL AND
- 12 OPERATIONAL REQUIREMENTS TO BE ABLE TO PERMIT MORE FOOD
- 13 VENDORS INTO THE ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES THAT EXIST. THERE ARE,
- 14 OF COURSE, A SECTION OF THE VENDORS THAT DID NOT GET FOLDED
- 15 INTO S.B.972. AND THOSE ARE THE ONES THAT WE'RE GOING TO
- 16 CONTINUE TO HAVE OPPORTUNITIES WITH, AND I WILL -- THERE'S NO
- 17 DEFINITION FOR IT, BUT WE CALL THEM POP-UP RESTAURANTS. SO
- 18 OFTENTIMES, YOU SEE A LOT OF THE POP-UP FOOD RESTAURANTS THAT
- 19 HAVE LIKE A TENT LIKE SET-UP WITH GRILLS AND SOME OF THE
- 20 EQUIPMENT THAT ARE LARGE-BASED EQUIPMENTS. S.B.972 DID NOT
- 21 CARVE OUT ANYTHING TO ADDRESS THOSE. AND SO, THAT'S WHERE WE
- 22 WILL CONTINUE TO STRUGGLE. AND WE ARE LOOKING FOR
- 23 OPPORTUNITIES. AND ONE OF THE OPPORTUNITIESTHAT WE CONSIDER A
- 24 GREAT SUCCESS IS AVENUE 26 IN THE CITY OF PICO RIVERA. WE DID
- 25 HAVE AN ORGANIZER THAT CAME TOGETHER, WAS OPERATING AVENUE 26



- 1 AND REALLY REACHED OUT AND GOT A LOT OF THE UNPERMITTED FOOD
- 2 VENDORS TO COME TOGETHER AND COME UNDER A COMMUNITY EVENT. AND
- 3 WE NOW HAVE 35 PERMITTED FOOD BOOTH OPERATORS WITH AN EVENT
- 4 ORGANIZER THAT ACTUALLY GREW FROM AN UNPERMITTED COMMUNITY
- 5 EVENT NOW TO A SANCTIONED COMMUNITY EVENT THAT HAS OVERSIGHT,
- 6 THAT IS MEETING PUBLIC HEALTH REGULATIONS.IT WASN'T EASY. WE
- 7 HAD TO BUILD TRUST. WE HAD TO GO OUT AND REALLY WORK WITH
- 8 THEM, BUT IT'S A SUCCESS. AND I THINK THAT'S SOMETHING THAT WE
- 9 NEED TO LOOK TOWARDS AS WE MOVE TO ADDRESSING POP-UP
- 10 RESTAURANTS. DEFINITELY WITH RESPECT TO YOUR SMALL FOOD CART
- 11 OPERATORS, THE LAW NOW MAKES IT EASIER FOR US TO BE ABLETO
- 12 PERMIT THEM. SO, A LOT OF YOUR FRUIT CARTS, YOUR HOT DOG
- 13 CARTS, YOUR [INDISCERNIBLE] CARTS, YOUR TAMALE CARTS, ALL OF
- 14 THOSE NOW ARE ABLE TO GET A PERMIT A LOT EASIER. THERE ARE
- 15 STILL SOME OPPORTUNITIES, AS WE TALKED ABOUT, AS FAR AS
- 16 GETTING ENOUGH CARTS THAT MEET THE REQUIREMENTS, BUT IT IS A
- 17 LOT MORE STRAIGHTFORWARD.

- 19 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: I WAS GOING TO TALK ABOUT THE PICO RIVERA
- 20 SUCCESS STORY WHEN IT WAS MY TURN TO SPEAK. YOU TOLD THE STORY
- 21 FIRST. GO AHEAD.

- 23 SUP. BARGER: IN CLOSING, I GET CALLS FROM CONSTITUENTS AND
- 24 CITIES FRUSTRATED ABOUT THE FACT THEY FEEL THAT WE'RE PUSHING
- 25 FOOD VENDORS INTO NEIGHBORHOODS, AND THEY'VE EXPRESSED



- 1 CONCERNS ABOUT TRASH, ALL THAT. AND THE TRUTH IS SOMEWHERE IN
- 2 BETWEEN. I WOULD ASK US, BECAUSE I DO BELIEVE -- THESE ARE
- 3 HARD WORKING PEOPLE, AND I KNOW WHY YOU DO IT, BUT IT IS HARD
- 4 FOR ME WHEN I HEAR THAT YOU POOR BLEACH ON THE FOOD. I
- 5 UNDERSTAND WHY, BUT WHEN I GET THE CALLS, IT MAKES -- IT
- 6 FRUSTRATES ME BECAUSE I KNOW THAT THOSE PEOPLE ARE BUYING
- 7 THAT, AND THAT THEY'RE TRYING TO PUT FOOD ON THE TABLE FOR
- 8 THEIR FAMILY. I'M NOT BEING CRITICAL OFYOU. IT'S JUST THIS ONE
- 9 IS A REALLY HARD ONE BECAUSE THESE ARE NOT INDIVIDUALS WHO ARE
- 10 TRYING TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF A COMMUNITY. THESE ARE INDIVIDUALS
- 11 THAT ARE WORKING TO TRY TO PUT FOOD ON THEIR FAMILY'S TABLE.
- 12 SO, MY ASK WOULD BE THAT YOU WORK, AND IT SOUNDS LIKE YOU ARE,
- 13 AND ITHANK YOU FOR THAT, WORK WITH THEM TO GET THEM INTO
- 14 COMPLIANCE, AND THEN WE'LL WORK WITH OUR CITIES TO ENSURE THAT
- 15 WE PROVIDE A SAFE ENVIRONMENT FOR FOOD VENDORS BECAUSE I SAY
- 16 "SAFE ENVIRONMENT" BECAUSE WE'RE SEEING FOOD VENDORS BEING
- 17 ATTACKED FOR NO REASON OTHER THAN SHOWING UP TO TRY TO PUT
- 18 FOOD ON THE TABLE FOR THEIR FAMILY. SO I APPRECIATE THE WORK
- 19 YOU'RE DOING. IT'S GOING TO BE A BALANCE. IT ALWAYS IS. AND
- 20 I'LL WORK WITH YOU WITH MY 20 CITIES AND THEN THE
- 21 UNINCORPORATED BECAUSE THEY'RE EVEN OUT IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY
- 22 IN THE MIDDLE OF NOWHERE. THEY'RE OUT THERE IN 110 DEGREE
- 23 WEATHER SELLING BECAUSE THEY NEED AN INCOME. I'M SENSITIVE TO
- 24 THAT. SO, THANK YOU FOR YOUR REPORT.



1 SUP. HAHN, CHAIR: THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR SOLIS.

- 3 SUP. SOLIS: YES, THANK YOU. I APPRECIATE THE PRESENTATION.
- 4 THIS HAS SOMETHING THAT MY OFFICE HAS BEEN WORKING FOR THE
- 5 LAST, I WANT TO SAY, MAYBE EIGHT YEARS I FEEL. AND I KNOW JOE
- 6 NIKITA, AT THE TIME, WAS VERY MUCH ENGAGED WITH US WHEN WE
- 7 DIDN'T HAVE AN OFFICE OF ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY. AND ALL OF
- 8 THESE ISSUES WERE VERY CHALLENGING FOR THE COUNTY. THERE'S A
- 9 WHOLE SLEW HAVE DIFFERENT ENFORCEMENT COMPONENTS THAT EVOLVE
- 10 AROUND ALL OF THIS, AND I THINK THERE IS GOING TO BE A NEED
- 11 FOR US TO REALLY COMMUNICATE WHAT OUR EFFORT IS GOING TO BE
- 12 AND HOW WE ARE DIFFERENT FROM CITIES, INCLUDING THE CITY OF
- 13 L.A., AND THE FACT THAT WE CAN ONLY REALLY IMPLEMENT SOME OF
- 14 THIS IN THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS. SO PEOPLE NEED TO BE CLEAR
- 15 ABOUT THAT BECAUSE NOT EVERYONE UNDERSTAND. THEY THINK WHEN
- 16 THE COUNTY DOES SOMETHING, IT'S FOR ALL OF OUR CITIES. WE CAN
- 17 LEAD, CERTAINLY. I THINK THAT'S CRITICAL, BUT WE ALSO HAVE TO
- 18 MINDFUL WHAT OTHER CITIES ARE DOING, AND SOMEHOW, I THINK
- 19 WE'RE GETTING BLAMED FOR SOME OF THAT, AS WELL, BECAUSE I KNOW
- 20 THAT, IN SOME OF THE CITIES I REPRESENT, PEOPLE THINK THE
- 21 COUNTY IMPOSES. SO I'M GETTING CALLS REGARDING WHAT THE LOCAL
- 22 CITY IS DOING BECAUSE THEY'RE NOT THERE TO ENFORCE NECESSARILY
- 23 THE HEALTH BUT THE ZONING. I WANTED TO RAISE THAT OUESTION TOO
- 24 BECAUSE I KNOW THAT IN OTHER PARTS OF THE COUNTRY, THE CITIES
- 25 OF NEW YORK ANDPORTLAND, FOR EXAMPLE, HAVE SET UP ZONES FOR



- 1 STREET VENDING WITH LESS REQUIREMENTS ASSOCIATED. AND THEY
- 2 ACTUALLY SPECIFIED CERTAIN AREAS. I WANT TO GET YOUR FEEDBACK
- 3 ON THAT FROM PUBLIC HEALTH AND THE D.E.O. IF YOU'VEEVEN
- 4 CONSIDERED THAT MODEL.

- 6 KELLY LOBIANCO: SURELY, THAT IS A GREAT MODEL. AND I THINK
- 7 IT'S SOMETHING THAT WE NEED TO WORK TOGETHER TO TRY AND FIND
- 8 LOCATIONS WHERE YOU CAN IDENTIFY SOME SAFE VENDING ZONES. I
- 9 KNOW I HAVE REACHED OUT TO MY COLLEAGUES IN SAN DIEGO, AND
- 10 THEY ALSO HAVE BEEN LOOKING AT THAT. IT WOULD BE GREAT IF WE
- 11 CAN FIND AND WORK WITH CITIES AND YOUR BOARD HERE TO IDENTIFY
- 12 LOCATIONS WHERE WE CAN PILOT THAT BECAUSE I THINK THAT WOULD
- 13 REALLY KIND OF MOVE FORWARD. AND SOME OF THE NEGATIVITY AS FAR
- 14 AS NOT BEING ABLE TO FIND OPPORTUNITIES FOR POP-UP VENDORS TO
- 15 COME INTO COMPLIANCE AND ALSO FOR FOOD CART VENDORS. AND SO,
- 16 DEFINITELY SOMETHING WE CAN FOLLOW UP ON. I'M FAMILIAR WITH
- 17 THE OREGON AND NEW YORK MODEL, AND I'D LOVE TO CONTINUE TO
- 18 EXPLORE THAT FURTHER WITH, OF COURSE, REGIONAL PLANNING AND
- 19 PUBLIC WORKS BECAUSE WE HAVE OTHER RULES THAT COME INTO PLAY
- 20 THAT WE WOULD NEED TO CONSIDER AS A COUNTY.

- 22 LIZA FRIAS: THANK YOU. I AGREE. I WOULD ALSO WOULD LOVE TO
- 23 WORK WITH YOU ALL AND THE BOARD TO EXPLORE THOSE OPTIONS. AND
- 24 I WILL JUST SAY, ABOUT SORT OF THE CONFUSION, THE ORDINANCE
- 25 THAT WE'LL BE PUTTING IN FRONT OF THE BOARD WILL BE FOR THE



- 1 UNINCORPORATED AREAS ONLY. SO, I HEAR YOU ABOUT MAKING THAT
- 2 CLEAR THAT IT'S FOR A PARTICULAR SET OF STREET VENDORS. ONE
- 3 THING THAT WE HAVE BEEN TALKING ABOUT IN OUR OFFICE IS THAT WE
- 4 DO PROVIDE SUPPORT FOR SMALL BUSINESSES, MICRO-BUSINESSES,
- 5 STREET VENDORS COUNTY-WIDE IN CONNECTION TO OUR GENERAL OFFICE
- 6 OF SMALL BUSINESS AND SUPPORTS. AND SO, MAKING SURE THAT WE'RE
- 7 WORKING WITH DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH TO MAKE SURE THAT WE
- 8 ARE COMMUNICATING THE SAME INFORMATION AS THEM WHEN WE'RE IN
- 9 COUNTY-WIDE OPPORTUNITIES AND ALSO REDIRECTING SPECIFIC ISSUES
- 10 THAT ARE CITY-BASED TO OUR COLLEAGUES IN THOSE CITIES, WHICH
- 11 HAS ALREADY HAPPENED IN CONVERSATIONS WITH L.A. CITY AND
- 12 CARSON AND BEYOND.

- 14 SUP. SOLIS: ARE YOUR TEAMS WORKING WITH DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC
- 15 WORKS, PARKS AND RECREATION, YOU SAID REGIONAL PLANNING, BUT
- 16 TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE ALL ON THE SAME PAGE BECAUSE I
- 17 THINKWITH PARKS, SOMETIMES YOU HAVE STREET VENDORS THAT ARE
- 18 THERE. SO I THINK THIS WILL BE VERY CRITICAL. HAVE YOU HEARD,
- 19 WHAT HAS THEIR RESPONSE BEEN?

- 21 KELLY LOBIANCO: OUR TEAMS MEET ON A BIWEEKLY BASIS. I THINK
- 22 EVERYONE MET THIS MORNING AT 8:30, ALL THE DEPARTMENTS YOU
- 23 JUST MENTIONED. WE ALSO WORK WITH TREASURY TAX COLLECTOR AND
- 24 OTHERS AS THERE ARE SPECIFIC ISSUES THAT COME UP, BUT WE
- 25 RECOGNIZE IT HAS TO BE A COLLECTIVE EFFORT THAT EVERYONE NEEDS



- 1 TO MUTUALLY UNDERSTAND THE RULES AND REGULATIONS THAT EACH
- 2 OTHER. AND THE DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY IS CERTAINLY
- 3 THERE TO MAKE SURE THAT WE ARE ENGAGING, BRINGING THAT
- 4 INFORMATION TO FOLKS, AND HELPING BRING STREET VENDORS AND
- 5 THOSE COMMUNITIES INTO COMPLIANCE BEFORE THERE IS AN ISSUE.

- 7 SUP. SOLIS: I THINK PEOPLE NEED TO UNDERSTAND IT'S ABOUT
- 8 REGULATING IT SO WE DON'T HAVE CIRCUMSTANCES THAT CAN CREATE
- 9 MORE PROBLEMS OR HAZARDS. I THINK ALL OF US BELIEVE IN THAT,
- 10 IN SAFETY, BUT ALSO PROTECTING THEM. I'M INTERESTED IN HEARING
- 11 ABOUT THE INCENTIVIZED EFFORTS, ESPECIALLY THE CARTS, THE
- 12 DESIGNING OF THE 200 CARTS, OR THE PROPOSAL THAT IS GOING TO
- 13 GO OUT BECAUSE HOW WILL PEOPLE KNOW ABOUT THAT AND WHAT WOULD
- 14 BE THE UNIT COST FOR SOMETHING LIKE THAT?

- 16 KELLY LOBIANCO: WE'RE CURRENTLY IN THE PROCESS OF PUTTING OUT
- 17 AN R.F.P. FOR THE PROTOTYPING. SO WE'RE A LITTLE BIT OF A WAYS
- 18 OFF ON ACTUALLY DISTRIBUTING CARTS. THESE ARE FOR HOT AND COLD
- 19 SERVING CARTS THAT ARE CODE COMPLIANT WITH OUR PARTNERS HERE
- 20 AT THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH. WE'LL HAVE TODO A MAJOR
- 21 CAMPAIGN AROUND THAT, THAT'S BUILT IN AND PART AND PARCEL OF
- 22 OUR AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN STREET VENDING PROJECT, WHICH IS
- 23 EDUCATION AND OUTREACH RELATED TO 1) ISSUES OF CURRENT
- 24 COMPLIANCE, 2) GETTING FOLKS AWARE OF THE ORDINANCE ONCE IT
- 25 GOES LIVE, AND HAVING MAJOR EVENTS AROUND COMMUNITY



- 1 REGISTRATION AND THEN ALSO DISPERSING OF THE CARTS. SO, THAT'S
- 2 TO COME AND BAKED INTO OUR PLAN, AND WE DO NOT YET HAVE THE
- 3 COST PER CART, BUT WE'LL KNOW A LITTLE BIT MORE ONCE WE HAVE
- 4 THE PROTOTYPES IN PLACE.

- 6 SUP. SOLIS: I KNOW THERE HAS BEEN A LOT OF DISCUSSION ABOUT
- 7 PEOPLE CONCERNED ABOUT THIS IDEA THAT THESE CARTS HAVE TO BE
- 8 20 FEET IN LENGTH, WHICH IS UNREASONABLE. AND THE FACT THAT
- 9 WE'RE LOOKING AT SOMETHING THAT IS GOING TO BE ENFORCEABLE AND
- 10 ACTUALLY AFFORDABLE, RIGHT? SO IF WE MAKE THEM AVAILABLE, I
- 11 THINK THAT CAN BE AN INCENTIVE AND HOPEFULLY GET OTHER CITY OR
- 12 LOCALES TO ALSO HELP BUY INTO THAT AND UNDERSTAND WHAT WE'RE
- 13 DOING AND MAKE THESE AVAILABLE AT A LOW COST OR MINIMAL COST.
- 14 AND I THINK YOU MENTIONED EARLIER I THINK IT'S THE \$50 MILLION
- 15 THAT WE'RE MAKING AVAILABLE ALSO FOR MOM AND POPS BUT ALSO FOR
- 16 STREET VENDORS. AND I MET MANY STREET VENDORS WHO HAVE
- 17 GRADUATED AFTER STREET VENDING, WHO NOW OWN THEIR OWN
- 18 STOREFRONTS OR RESTAURANTS. IN FACT, I THINK SOME HAVE BEEN
- 19 HONORED BY US IN MONTEBELLO, WHERE THEY STARTED OUT AS STREET
- 20 VENDORS, AND NOW THEY HAVE I THINK IT'S ON 6TH STREET IN
- 21 MONTEBELLO, WHERE THEY ACTUALLY HAVE KIND OF A COMMISSARY.
- 22 THEY ACTUALLY TEACH PEOPLE HOWHOW TO DO -- THROUGH A BUSINESS
- 23 PLAN, HOW TO RUN THEIR BUSINESS, HOW TO SALE THEIR WARES,

- 16 AND PROGRAM WITHIN THE OFFICE OF SMALL BUSINESS, THIS IS
- 17 CERTAINLY SOMETHING THAT NEEDS TO CONTINUE IN PERPETUITY
- 18 BEYOND THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN TO MAKE SURE WE ARE OFFERING
- 19 THAT CARE FIRST APPROACH. AND I VERY MUCH APPRECIATE YOUR
- 20 PERSPECTIVE ON WHAT PATHWAYS LOOK LIKE FOR FOLKS IN THE STREET
- 21 VENDING COMMUNITY. I THINK THERE IS A LOT OF INTERESTING
- 22 MODELS OUT THERE AROUND STREET VENDING TO BRICK AND MORTAR,
- 23 AND I WOULD LOVE TO EXPLORE THOSE, ESPECIALLY AFTER WE GET THE
- 24 REGISTRATION PROCESS IN PLACE.

- 11 VENDORS AND LOW INCOME ENTREPRENEURS HAVE A CLEAR PATHWAY TO
- 12 SAFELY OPERATE IN THE CITY OF L.A. I WANT TO ALIGN MYSELF WITH
- 13 SUPERVISOR BARGER'S COMMENTS AND ASK THAT THE DEPARTMENT OF
- 14 PUBLIC HEALTH REALLY, FRANKLY, DOUBLE DOWN YOUR INSPECTORS
- 15 PERSPECTIVE ON WORKING TO BE MORE PROACTIVE AND SUPPORTIVE OF
- 16 VENDORS AND LESS PUNITIVE. YOU HEARD THE EXAMPLES OF WHAT HAS
- 17 TO BE DONE. I THINK IF YOU OPERATE ON THE FRONT END AND INFORM

- 1 THREE OF MY UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES, FLORENCE-FIRESTONE, EL
- 2 CAMINO VILLAGE, AND WISEBURN, AND THANK TO YOU THE DEPARTMENT
- 3 OF ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY FOR COMING ANDHAVING STAFF PRESENT AT
- 4 OUR COMMUNITY TOWN HALLS BECAUSE STREET VENDING, CART
- 5 TAKEOVERS, AND THE UNHOUSED ARE THREE TOPICS THAT ARE
- 6 CONSISTENTLY TOP OF MIND FOR RESIDENTS IN THE AREA. SO WHILE
- 7 RESIDENTS TO COME "COMPLAIN ABOUT VENDORS," WHO THEY ARE
- 8 REALLY COMPLAINING ABOUT ARE THEPOP-UPS, THE POP-UPS THAT TAKE

- 15 LISA LOBIANCO: I DO NOT THINK IT IS, BUT I WILL NEED TO
- 16 CONFIRM WITH YOU AND COME BACK BECAUSE IT'S STILL IN DRAFT
- 17 RIGHT NOW.

- 19 SUP. MITCHELL: OKAY BECAUSE I THINK, AT LEAST FOR ME, I DON'T
- 20 KNOW IFOTHERS EXPERIENCE THAT -- OH, GO AHEAD.

- 22 DR. QUICK: I CAN GO AHEAD AND ANSWER THAT. NO, IT WOULD NOT
- 23 APPLY BECAUSE CURRENTLY THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DOES NOT ALLOW
- 24 POP-UP RESTAURANTS TO OPERATE ON THE STREET. SO, IN THE STATE
- 25 OF CALIFORNIA, YOU HAVE PERMANENT FOOD FACILITIES, MOBILE FOOD

- 2 FACILITY IS WHAT WE ARE TALKING ABOUT WITH S.B.972. AND THAT'S
- 3 YOUR FOOD CARTS. IT ALSO INCLUDES YOUR SIDEWALK VENDORS NOW
- 4 THAT CAN SELL PRODUCE OFF THE STREET, AND THEN YOU HAVE YOUR
- 5 TEMPORARY FOOD FACILITIES THAT THOSE ARE ONLY ABLE TO OPERATE
- 6 IN CONJUNCTION WITH A COMMUNITY EVENT, AND THAT'S THE AVENUE
- 7 26 MODEL THAT WE WOULD LIKE TO CONTINUE. I THINK AN
- 8 OPPORTUNITY WOULD BE TO CREATE LIKEA SAFE VENDING ZONE, WHERE
- 9 YOU COULD HAVE A COMMUNITY EVENT IN A CITY, WHERE YOU'D BE
- 10 ABLE TO INVITE POP-UPS THAT WOULD BE ABLE TO GET PERMITTED AS
- 11 A TEMPORARY FOOD FACILITY, GET REGULATED AND BE ABLE TO COMPLY

- 15 SUP. MITCHELL: SO, WE KNOW THAT POP-UPS HAVEBECOME PERMANENT
- 16 STRUCTURES. WE ALL KNOW WHAT INTERSECTION, WHAT BLOCK. IT'S
- 17 LIKE THEY HAVE PERMANENT RESIDENCY. SO WHAT IS THE PLAN FOR
- 18 POP-UPS BECAUSE GIVEN THE FACT THAT THEY REALLY GREW DURING
- 19 COVID BECAUSE YOU COULD DO OUTDOOR DINING, SO DO YOU KNOW IF
- 20 THERE IS A PLAN ON THE HORIZON AT THE STATE LEVEL, OR DO WE
- 21 HAVE A PLAN BECAUSE IT THE POP-UPS THAT ARE GIVING RESIDENTIAL
- 22 COMMUNITIES, PARDON THE EXPRESSION, DEEP HEARTBURN BECAUSE OF
- 23 TRASH, OIL? AND SOME IN MY COMMUNITY HAVE QUOTED LIKE
- 24 LITERALLY STREET SAFETY, WHERE THEY MAY PARK THEIR TRUCK OR
- 25 WHATEVER THEY'RE USING TO HAUL SUPPLIES CLOSE TO A CORNER THAT



- 1 CREATES A BLIND CORNER FOR PEOPLE TO TRY TO MAKE RIGHT HAND
- 2 TURNS, BIG DEAL IN THE SECOND DISTRICT IN THAT UNDERDIVISION
- 3 ZERO PLAN, WE HAVE THE HIGHEST NUMBER OF TRAFFIC FATALITIES.
- 4 IT'S AN ISSUE OF VEHICULAR SAFETY, A VARIETY OF THINGS. SO, ON
- 5 WHOSE HORIZON ARE THE POP-UPS IN TERMS OF SOME KIND OF
- 6 REGULATION?

- 8 DR. QUICK: YOU BRING UP A REALLY GOOD POINT, AND I THINK
- 9 THAT'S SOMETHING THAT WILL PROBABLY HAVE TO BE DEALT WITH
- 10 LEGISLATIVELY. WITH S.B. 972, IT REALLY DID CREATE AN
- 11 OPPORTUNITY TO EXPAND FOOD VENDING. AND THAT WAS THE PURPOSE
- 12 OF THE BILL WAS TO REALLY TRY TO MAKE IT EASIER TO ADDRESS
- 13 FOOD CART VENDORS THAT WERE STRUGGLING WITH THE SIZE, AS YOU
- 14 MENTIONED, SUPERVISOR SOLIS, THE SIZE OF THE CART, RIGHT? SO
- 15 YOU WERE ABLE TO REDUCE STRUCTURAL AND OPERATIONAL
- 16 REQUIREMENTS SO IT'S MORE OF A PUSH CART, BUT IT'S TYPICALLY A
- 17 SMALL MENU ITEM, A TAMALE CART, A [INDISCERNIBLE] CART.
- 18 UNFORTUNATELY, THAT DID PROLIFERATE NOW TO POP-UP RESTAURANTS.
- 19 AND TO SOME EXTENT, OUR TOOLS IN OUR TOOLBOX WHEN IT COMES TO
- 20 ENFORCEMENT IS VERY LIMITED NOW. AND SO, UNLESS THERE IS A
- 21 LEGISLATIVE CHANGE TO ADDRESS AND GIVE US SOME MORE TOOLS TO
- 22 BE ABLE TO ADDRESS POP-UP FOOD VENDORS, WE'RE GOING TO BE IN
- 23 THE SAME CONVERSATION PROBABLY YEAR AFTER YEAR. WE ARE DOING
- 24 OUR BEST. WHEN WE GO OUT AND WE ADDRESS POP-UP FOOD VENDORS,
- 25 WE ALWAYS START WITH AN EDUCATIONAL APPROACH, BUT IT'S



- 1 DIFFICULT TO EDUCATE THEM WHEN THERE IS NO AVENUE RIGHT NOW TO
- 2 BE ABLE TO PERMIT THEM. THEY ARE OPERATING WITH LARGE
- 3 RESTAURANT-STYLE EQUIPMENT. AND UNFORTUNATELY, WHAT WE HAVE
- 4 FOUND IS WE HAVE A LOT OF RESTAURANTS THAT ARE ACTUALLY NOW
- 5 DOING POP-UP RESTAURANTS BECAUSE IT'S MORE LUCRATIVE FOR THEM
- 6 TO BE ABLE TO OPERATE ON THE SIDEWALK THAN IT IS FOR THEM TO
- 7 OPERATE POTENTIALLY THEIR BRICK AND MORTAR. AND THEY'RE
- 8 OPERATING IN MULTIPLE JURISDICTIONS. SO IT IS DEFINITELY A

- 18 SUP. MITCHELL: I APPRECIATE THAT. I'M SURE MY TEAM UNDERSTOOD,
- 19 BUT I REALIZED IN LISTENING TO YOU THAT I'VE BEEN USING THE
- 20 TERMINOLOGY GENERICALLY BASED ON WHAT I'M HEARING FROM MY
- 21 CONSTITUENTS, BUT WHEN THEY DESCRIBE AND BRING PICTURES TO OUR
- 22 COMMUNITY TOWN HALLS, IT'S THE POP-UPS. AND SO, WE REALLY NEED
- 23 TO PROVIDE CLARIFICATION BECAUSE WE'VE BEEN SAYING WAIT FOR
- 24 THE ORDINANCE TO COME. AND WE NEED TO BE HONEST AND DIRECT
- 25 THAT THE ORDINANCE IS NOT GOING TO IMPACT THE POP-UPS. I JUST



- 1 GOT A NOTE THAT THE STATE-WIDE ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH
- 2 ORGANIZATION DIDN'T APPEAR HAVE TO AN APPETITE TO ADDRESS POP-
- 3 UPS IN S.B.972. SO I THINK THAT THE COLLECTIVE WE, STATE
- 4 POLICYMAKERS AND LOCAL JURISDICTIONS, WILL HAVE TO WORK TO DO
- 5 AROUND THE POP-UPS. LAST QUESTION FOR ME, MADAM CHAIR, I
- 6 APPRECIATE THE COMMENT WITH REGARD TO COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT,
- 7 BUT I'M CONCERNED ABOUT THE USE OF WEBINARS LIKE EXCLUSIVELY
- 8 TO ENGAGE THE COMMUNITY. I ALSO WANT TO ENSURE WE'VE GOT --
- 9 WE'VE ADDRESSED LANGUAGE ACCESS. AND SO, ARE THE PRESENTATIONS
- 10 CONDUCTED WITH SIMULTANEOUS TRANSLATION INTO SPANISH AND

- 14 LIZA FRIAS: I CAN SPEAK TO THAT. WE ACTUALLY STARTED WITH
- 15 WEBINARS. WE'RE BEING VERY STRATEGIC, TO SOME EXTENT, IN HOW
- 16 WE'RE DOING OUTREACH. WE ARE COMING TO YOUR BOARD IN A COUPLE
- 17 OF WEEKS FOR FEES. SO, RIGHT NOW, OUR ACTUAL EXISTING FEES
- 18 COST MORE THAN WHAT WE ARE PROPOSING. SO, WE'VE BEEN DOING A
- 19 LOT OF OUTREACH THROUGH WEBINARS, BUT THAT'S NOT THE ONLY WAY
- 20 WE'RE GOING TO BE ENGAGING WITH ALL OF OUR VENDORS. WE ARE
- 21 WORKING WITH INCLUSIVE ACTION THROUGH THE WORK WITH D.E.O.
- 22 TOCONDUCT IN-PERSON. WHEN WE HAD WEBINARS, WE HAVE ACTUALLY
- 23 RECEIVED INVITATIONS FROM ADVOCATES TO GO AND MEET WITH THEM.
- 24 WE WANT TO CREATE SMALL WORKSHOPS BECAUSE IF YOU'VE LISTENED
- 25 TO THE WEBINARS, IT CAN BE OVERWHELMING. I'LL BE HONEST WITH



- 1 YOU. AND SO, WE REALLY NEED TO PUT SOME SMALL SESSIONS
- 2 TOGETHER TOWALK THROUGH THE VENDORS ON HOW YOUR DEVELOP
- 3 WRITTEN OPERATING PROCEDURES, HOW DOYOU COMPLETE AN
- 4 APPLICATION. NOW THERE'S OPPORTUNITIES TO BE ABLE TO STORE
- 5 YOUR CART AT HOME. YOU'RE ABLE TO NOW SHARE A RESTAURANT AND
- 6 BE ABLE TO UTILIZE A RESTAURANT. SO, THERE IS A LOT OF NEW
- 7 THINGS. AND SO, THIS IS ALL WORK IN PROGRESS. AND THERE WILL
- 8 BE IN-PERSON WEBINARS. WE REALLY DID MANUFACTURER WEBINARS
- 9 BECAUSE WE UNDERSTOOD THAT -- I MEAN REALLY NEED MANUFACTURERS
- 10 TO BUILD MORE CARTS, QUITE HONESTLY. AND SO, WE'RE TRYING TO
- 11 ENCOURAGE THEM THAT THERE IS NOW A NEW OPPORTUNITY TO BE ABLE
- 12 TO MAKE MONEY AT THE END OF THE DAY BECAUSE THAT'S WHAT THEY
- 13 ARE IN BUSINESS FOR. AND THIS IS A NEW OPPORTUNITY FOR
- 14 MANUFACTURERS TOO. SO, WE STARTED WITH MANUFACTURERS, AND THEN
- 15 WE WENT OVER AND WE HAVE BOTH ENGLISH AND SPANISH WEBINARS.
- 16 WE'RE NOT EVEN DOING SIMULTANEOUS TRANSLATIONS. WE'RE OFFERING
- 17 THEM BOTH INDIVIDUALLY TO SPANISH AND ENGLISH. SO, IT'S GOING
- 18 TO BE A CONTINUING, AS WE'RE HEARING FROM D.L, LIKE OUR
- 19 PARTNERS, IT'S GOING TO TAKE SOME TIME. SO, UNFORTUNATELY AND
- 20 FORTUNATELY, WE HAVE A NEW OPPORTUNITY IN FRONT OF US WITH
- 21 S.B.972. IT WILL TAKE US TIME TO BRING EVERYBODY INTO THE
- 22 FOLD, AND THAT'S WHY WE HAVE PRETTY MUCHSAID FOR A YEAR WHERE
- 23 WE'RE JUST FOCUSED ON EDUCATION AND OUTREACH. THERE IS NO
- 24 FINING PROCESS. THERE IS NO ADMINISTRATIVE FINES THAT WE'LL BE
- 25 ISSUING BECAUSE WE REALLY WANT TO MAKE SURE THAT WE'RE



- 1 ENCOURAGING PEOPLE TO COME INTO COMPLIANCE. I AGREE WITH YOU
- 2 THAT POP-UP RESTAURANTS WILL BE A CHALLENGE FOR US. SO WE JUST
- 3 HAVE TO RECOGNIZE THATTHAT'S GOING TO BE SOMETHING WE'LL HAVE
- 4 TO WORK THROUGH.

- 6 SUP. MITCHELL: I'LL JUST SAY I THINK THAT'S THE NEXT HORIZON,
- 7 WANTING TO AFFORD THOSE BUSINESSMEN AND WOMEN AN OPPORTUNITY
- 8 THAT WE HAVE FOCUSED ON VENDORS IN TERMS OF ACKNOWLEDGING IT'S
- 9 A BUSINESS. PEOPLE TRY TO PUT FOOD ON THETABLE. AND HOW DO WE
- 10 GET THEM A PLACE WHERE THEY ARE NOT IN DIRECT CONFLICT WITH
- 11 RESIDENTS AROUND WHERE THEY'RE PARKING, BLOCKING SIDEWALKS.
- 12 I'VE HAD PEOPLE WHO ARE RELIANT ON WALKING AIDS, EITHER
- 13 WHEELCHAIRS OR WALKERS SAYING, LITERALLY, ONCE THEY SET UP AT
- 14 5:00 P.M., I CAN'T LEAVE MY HOUSE BECAUSE I CAN'T ACCESS THE
- 15 SIDEWALK. SO WE'VE GOT TO FIGURE OUT A WAY IN WHICH THE TWO
- 16 CAN COEXIST IN SOME KIND OF WAY. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. THANK
- 17 YOU, MADAM CHAIR.

- 10 EXTRA INSPECTIONS. YOU WANT AN INSPECTION OF THE RESTAURANT
- 11 WHERE THE CART IS GOING TO BE PRODUCING THEIR FOOD, AND AN
- 12 INSPECTION OF THE HOME. EACH ONE IS \$186. YOU ALSO HAVE A
- 13 GEOGRAPHIC LIMITATION. YOU GUYS ARE OUTSIDE IN BALDWIN PARK.
- 14 SO MANY VENDORS CAN'T AFFORD TO TAKE TWO HOURS TO DRIVE THERE,
- 15 TWO HOURS THERE, TWO HOURS BACK. AND THEN YOU USUALLY HAVE

- 1 EDEN AMARATTO: EDEN AMARATTO. PLEASE IMPLEMENT M.E.H.K.O. INTO
- 2 CODE. I HEAR A LOT ABOUT EDUCATION. EDUCATE WHAT WHEN THERE IS
- 3 AN IMPOSSIBLE PATHWAY? ARIZONA JUST ATTEMPTED TO EXPAND
- 4 M.E.H.K.O., WHICH IS THE TAMALE BILL. WE ARE JUST STARTING
- 5 M.E.H.K.O.S WHEN RIVERSIDE ALREADY HAS IT AS WELL, THE COUNTY
- 6 OF RIVERSIDE. AND WE ARE BACKED UP. WITHOUT M.E.H.K.O., IN
- 7 ORDER TO QUALIFY, YOU NEED A COMMISSARY. LA PALMA, WHICH HAD
- 8 OVER 300 VENDORS USING THEIR COMMISSARY, THEY JUST SHUT DOWN
- 9 RECENTLY. AND D.P.H. SHOWS UP AGGRESSIVELY, AND THEY BRING
- 10 POLICE. CITIES LIKE EL MONTE, MAYOR ANCONA SAID THE REASON WHY
- 11 SHE HAS A PUSH BACK IN USING ZONING NOW IS BECAUSE RESTAURANTS
- 12 AND PROPERTY OWNERS FUNDED HER CAMPAIGN. TACO STANDS HAVE NO
- 13 PATHWAY. SO IN ORDER TO SEE YOUR -- YOU ARE TELLING ME YOU
- 14 NEED A \$50,000 PREREQUISITE FOR A LUNCH TRUCK OR A BRICK AND
- 15 MORTAR? A LOT OF RESTAURANTS LOST THEIR BUSINESS DURING THE

- 1 C.P.C.ARE GATEKEEPING. THEY HAVE ACCUSED VENDORS AND USED

- 5 MITCHELL WOULD LIKE TO CLARIFY.

- 16 HAVE \$400, AND THEY ARE ACTUALLY EMPTY. AND C.P.C. SHOWS NO
- 17 TRANSPARENCY, SO YOU TELL ME WHERE'S ALL THE MONEY FOR THAT.
- 18 THAT'S FOR YOU, KELLY, THAT YOU SAID THAT SOMETHING ABOUT
- 19 C.P.C. WE'LL GET BACK TO THAT, RIGHT NOW. ALSO THOSE RECENT
- 20 REGULATIONS THAT ARE PUT IN PLACE ARE TO TARGET THE STRUGGLING
- 21 CLASS. SO, DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT. DO THE RIGHT THING. PROTECT

- 17 SUP. MITCHELL: I DID WITH TWO QUICK THINGS. FIRST OF ALL, I
- 18 WILL PROVIDE THE CLARIFICATION ON ALPINE VILLAGE, HOPEFULLY
- 19 FOR THE LAST TIME. S.D.2 SOUGHT SUPPORT FROM THE CALIFORNIA
- 20 COMMUNITY FOUNDATION. I WISH YOU WOULD STAY SO YOU COULD HEAR
- 21 THE EXPLANATION. SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT TWO SOUGHT -- GOT A
- 22 GRANT FROM THE CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY FOUNDATION TO GIVE GRANTS
- 23 TO ALPINE VILLAGE VENDORS. BECAUSE IT WAS PHILANTHROPIC
- 24 DOLLARS, THERE WERE NOT -- IT WAS FLEXIBLE. WE DID NOT ASK FOR

- 18 APPROVED, THEY WILL ACCEPT THAT AND NOT MOVE FORWARD. WITH
- 19 RESPECT TO SAN BERNARDINO, THEY ARE FOLLOWING OUR EXISTING
- 20 PROCESS, SO JUST SO THAT YOU KNOW, WHAT HAPPENS WHEN YOU COME
- 21 INTO, OF COURSE, OBTAIN YOUR PERMIT, THE FIRST THING IS WE
- 22 HAVE TO REVIEW AND APPROVE THE CART TO MAKE SURE THAT THE CART

- 22 TOWARDS COMING IN COMPLIANCE WITH THE D.O.J. CONSENT DECREE.
- 23 ALSO IN LINE WITH THIS, THE DISCUSSION ON THE ONLINE TRACKING
- 24 OF BEDS AND SERVICE NAVIGATION, I WOULD LIKE TO REMIND THE
- 25 BOARD AND J.C.O.D. INTERIM DIRECTOR, JUDGE ARMSTEAD, THAT OVER



- 1 THREE YEARS AGO, THIS VERY SPECIFIC NEED WAS NAMED BY
- 2 COMMUNITY AND ADOPTED BY THIS BOARD ASRECOMMENDATION 85 OF THE
