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**A BILL**

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*  
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any

1 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the  
2 Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September  
3 30, 2022, and for other purposes, namely:

4 TITLE I

5 LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

6 SENATE

7 EXPENSE ALLOWANCES

8 For expense allowances of the Vice President,  
9 \$20,000; the President Pro Tempore of the Senate,  
10 \$40,000; Majority Leader of the Senate, \$40,000; Minor-  
11 ity Leader of the Senate, \$40,000; Majority Whip of the  
12 Senate, \$10,000; Minority Whip of the Senate, \$10,000;  
13 President Pro Tempore Emeritus, \$15,000; Chairmen of  
14 the Majority and Minority Conference Committees, \$5,000  
15 for each Chairman; and Chairmen of the Majority and Mi-  
16 nority Policy Committees, \$5,000 for each Chairman; in  
17 all, \$195,000.

18 For representation allowances of the Majority and  
19 Minority Leaders of the Senate, \$15,000 for each such  
20 Leader; in all, \$30,000.

11 \$7,000,000 shall be allocated solely for the purpose of pro-  
12 viding financial compensation to Senate interns.

13 OFFICIAL MAIL COSTS

14 For expenses necessary for official mail costs of the  
15 Senate, \$300,000.

16 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

17 REQUIRING AMOUNTS REMAINING IN SENATORS' OFFI-  
18 CIAL PERSONNEL AND OFFICE EXPENSE ACCOUNT  
19 TO BE USED FOR DEFICIT REDUCTION OR TO RE-  
20 DUCE THE FEDERAL DEBT

21 SEC. 101. Notwithstanding any other provision of  
22 law, any amounts appropriated under this Act under the  
23 heading "SENATE" under the heading "CONTINGENT  
24 EXPENSES OF THE SENATE" under the heading "SEN-  
25 ATORS' OFFICIAL PERSONNEL AND OFFICE EXPENSE AC-





1       “(b) SERGEANT AT ARMS BUSINESS CONTINUITY  
2 AND DISASTER RECOVERY FUND.—

3               “(1) DEFINITIONS.—In this subsection—

4                       “(A) the term ‘Fund’ means the Sergeant  
5 at Arms Business Continuity and Disaster Re-  
6 covery Fund established under paragraph (2);  
7 and

8                       “(B) the term ‘Sergeant at Arms’ means  
9 the Sergeant at Arms and Doorkeeper of the  
10 Senate.

11               “(2) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established  
12 under the heading ‘CONTINGENT EXPENSES OF THE  
13 SENATE’ an account to be known as the ‘Sergeant  
14 at Arms Business Continuity and Disaster Recovery  
15 Fund’.

16               “(3) USE OF AMOUNTS.—Amounts in the Fund  
17 shall be available to the Sergeant at Arms for pur-  
18 poses of the business continuity and disaster recov-  
19 ery needs of the Senate.

20               “(4) AUTHORITY TO TRANSFER.—

21                       “(A) IN GENERAL.—Subject to subpara-  
22 graph (C), prior to the date of the withdrawal  
23 of amounts appropriated under the heading  
24 ‘CONTINGENT EXPENSES OF THE SENATE—  
25 SERGEANT AT ARMS AND DOORKEEPER OF THE

1 SENATE’ in accordance with the matter under  
2 the heading ‘GENERAL PROVISION’ under  
3 chapter XI of the Third Supplemental Appro-  
4 priation Act, 1957 (2 U.S.C. 4107), any unobli-  
5 gated balances of expired discretionary appro-  
6 priations of such amounts may be transferred  
7 by the Sergeant at Arms to the Fund.

8 “(B) PERIOD OF AVAILABILITY.—Amounts  
9 transferred under subparagraph (A) shall re-  
10 main available until expended.

11 “(C) NOTICE.—If the Sergeant at Arms  
12 intends to transfer amounts under subpara-  
13 graph (A), the Sergeant at Arms shall submit  
14 to the Committee on Appropriations of the Sen-  
15 ate written notice not later than 15 days before  
16 the date of the withdrawal of such amounts in  
17 accordance with the matter under the heading  
18 ‘GENERAL PROVISION’ under chapter XI of  
19 the Third Supplemental Appropriation Act,  
20 1957 (2 U.S.C. 4107).

21 “(D) APPLICABILITY.—The authority to  
22 transfer amounts under this paragraph shall  
23 apply with respect to amounts appropriated for  
24 fiscal year 2022, or any fiscal year thereafter.

1           “(5) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—  
2           There are authorized to be appropriated to the Fund  
3           such sums as are necessary for fiscal year 2022 and  
4           each fiscal year thereafter.”.

7           For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-  
8           atives, \$1,714,996,045, as follows:

9                           HOUSE LEADERSHIP OFFICES

10          For salaries and expenses, as authorized by law,  
11          \$34,949,640, including: Office of the Speaker,  
12          \$10,036,950, including \$35,000 for official expenses of  
13          the Speaker; Office of the Majority Floor Leader,  
14          \$3,565,870, including \$15,000 for official expenses of the  
15          Majority Leader; Office of the Minority Floor Leader,  
16          \$10,036,950, including \$17,500 for official expenses of  
17          the Minority Leader; Office of the Majority Whip, includ-  
18          ing the Chief Deputy Majority Whip, \$2,962,080, includ-  
19          ing \$5,000 for official expenses of the Majority Whip; Of-  
20          fice of the Minority Whip, including the Chief Deputy Mi-  
21          nority Whip, \$2,684,990, including \$5,000 for official ex-  
22          penses of the Minority Whip; Republican Conference,  
23          \$2,831,400; Democratic Caucus, \$2,831,400: *Provided*,  
24          That such amount for salaries and expenses shall remain  
25          available from January 3, 2022 until January 2, 2023.

1 MEMBERS' REPRESENTATIONAL ALLOWANCES  
2 INCLUDING MEMBERS' CLERK HIRE, OFFICIAL EXPENSES  
3 OF MEMBERS, AND OFFICIAL MAIL

4 For Members' representational allowances, including  
5 Members' clerk hire, official expenses, and official mail,  
6 \$774,400,000.

7 ALLOWANCE FOR COMPENSATION OF INTERNS IN  
8 MEMBER OFFICES

9 For the allowance established under section 120 of  
10 the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2019 (2  
11 U.S.C. 5322a) for the compensation of interns who serve  
12 in the offices of Members of the House of Representatives,  
13 \$15,435,000, to remain available through January 2,  
14 2023: *Provided*, That notwithstanding section 120(b) of  
15 such Act, an office of a Member of the House of Rep-  
16 resentatives may use not more than \$35,000 of the allow-  
17 ance available under this heading during legislative year  
18 2022.

19 ALLOWANCE FOR COMPENSATION OF INTERNS IN HOUSE  
20 LEADERSHIP OFFICES

21 For the allowance established under section 113 of  
22 the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2020 (2  
23 U.S.C. 5106) for the compensation of interns who serve  
24 in House leadership offices, \$438,000, to remain available  
25 through January 2, 2023: *Provided*, That of the amount

1 provided under this heading, \$240,500 shall be available  
2 for the compensation of interns who serve in offices of the  
3 majority, to be allocated among such offices by the Speak-  
4 er of the House of Representatives, and \$197,500 shall  
5 be available for the compensation of interns who serve in  
6 offices of the minority, to be allocated among such offices  
7 by the Minority Floor Leader.

8 ALLOWANCE FOR COMPENSATION OF INTERNS IN HOUSE  
9 STANDING, SPECIAL AND SELECT COMMITTEE OFFICES

10 For the allowance established under section  
11 113(a)(1) of this Act for the compensation of interns who  
12 serve in offices of standing, special, and select committees  
13 (other than the Committee on Appropriations),  
14 \$1,943,910, to remain available through January 2, 2023:  
15 *Provided*, That of the amount provided under this head-  
16 ing, \$971,955 shall be available for the compensation of  
17 interns who serve in offices of the majority, and \$971,955  
18 shall be available for the compensation of interns who  
19 serve in offices of the minority, to be allocated among such  
20 offices by the Chair, in consultation with the ranking mi-  
21 nority member, of the Committee on House Administra-  
22 tion.

1 ALLOWANCE FOR COMPENSATION OF INTERNS IN HOUSE  
2 APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE OFFICES

3 For the allowance established under section  
4 113(a)(2) of this Act for the compensation of interns who  
5 serve in offices of the Committee on Appropriations,  
6 \$345,584, to remain available through January 2, 2023:  
7 *Provided*, That of the amount provided under this head-  
8 ing, \$172,792 shall be available for the compensation of  
9 interns who serve in offices of the majority, and \$172,792  
10 shall be available for the compensation of interns who  
11 serve in offices of the minority, to be allocated among such  
12 offices by the Chair, in consultation with the ranking mi-  
13 nority member, of the Committee on Appropriations.

14 COMMITTEE EMPLOYEES  
15 STANDING COMMITTEES, SPECIAL AND SELECT

16 For salaries and expenses of standing committees,  
17 special and select, authorized by House resolutions,  
18 \$167,101,000: *Provided*, That such amount shall remain  
19 available for such salaries and expenses until December  
20 31, 2022, except that \$3,100,000 of such amount shall  
21 remain available until expended for committee room up-  
22 grading.

23 COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS

24 For salaries and expenses of the Committee on Ap-  
25 propriations, \$29,917,250, including studies and examina-

1 tions of executive agencies and temporary personal serv-  
2 ices for such committee, to be expended in accordance with  
3 section 202(b) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of  
4 1946 and to be available for reimbursement to agencies  
5 for services performed: *Provided*, That such amount shall  
6 remain available for such salaries and expenses until De-  
7 cember 31, 2022.

8 SALARIES, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

9 For compensation and expenses of officers and em-  
10 ployees, as authorized by law, \$288,480,800, including:  
11 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Clerk, includ-  
12 ing the positions of the Chaplain and the Historian, and  
13 including not more than \$25,000 for official representa-  
14 tion and reception expenses, of which not more than  
15 \$20,000 is for the Family Room and not more than  
16 \$2,000 is for the Office of the Chaplain, \$36,500,000, of  
17 which \$9,000,000 shall remain available until expended;  
18 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Sergeant at  
19 Arms, including the position of Superintendent of Garages  
20 and the Office of Emergency Management, and including  
21 not more than \$3,000 for official representation and re-  
22 ception expenses, \$27,695,000, of which \$15,000,000  
23 shall remain available until expended; for salaries and ex-  
24 penses of the Office of the Chief Administrative Officer  
25 including not more than \$3,000 for official representation

1 and reception expenses, \$193,187,800, of which  
2 \$30,000,000 shall remain available until expended; for sal-  
3 aries and expenses of the Office of Diversity and Inclusion,  
4 \$3,000,000, of which \$1,000,000 shall remain available  
5 until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of  
6 the Whistleblower Ombudsman, \$1,250,000; for salaries  
7 and expenses of the Office of the Inspector General,  
8 \$5,019,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of Gen-  
9 eral Counsel, \$1,912,000; for salaries and expenses of the  
10 Office of the Parliamentarian, including the Parliamen-  
11 tarian, \$2,000 for preparing the Digest of Rules, and not  
12 more than \$1,000 for official representation and reception  
13 expenses, \$2,134,000; for salaries and expenses of the Of-  
14 fice of the Law Revision Counsel of the House,  
15 \$3,600,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office of the  
16 Legislative Counsel of the House, \$12,625,000; for sala-  
17 ries and expenses of the Office of Interparliamentary Af-  
18 fairs, \$934,000; for other authorized employees,  
19 \$624,000.

20 ALLOWANCES AND EXPENSES

21 For allowances and expenses as authorized by House  
22 resolution or law, \$399,984,861, including: supplies, mate-  
23 rials, administrative costs and Federal tort claims,  
24 \$1,555,000; official mail for committees, leadership of-  
25 fices, and administrative offices of the House, \$190,000;



1 Government contributions for health, retirement, Social  
2 Security, contractor support for actuarial projections, and  
3 other applicable employee benefits, \$356,000,000, to re-  
4 main available until March 31, 2023, except that  
5 \$25,000,000 of such amount shall remain available until  
6 expended; salaries and expenses for Business Continuity  
7 and Disaster Recovery, \$23,812,861, of which \$6,000,000  
8 shall remain available until expended; transition activities  
9 for new members and staff, \$5,895,000, to remain avail-  
10 able until expended; Wounded Warrior Program and the  
11 Congressional Gold Star Family Fellowship Program,  
12 \$9,294,000, to remain available until expended; Office of  
13 Congressional Ethics, \$1,738,000; and miscellaneous  
14 items including purchase, exchange, maintenance, repair  
15 and operation of House motor vehicles, interparliamentary  
16 receptions, and gratuities to heirs of deceased employees  
17 of the House, \$1,500,000.

18 HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES MODERNIZATION

19 INITIATIVES ACCOUNT

20 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

21 For the House of Representatives Modernization Ini-  
22 tiatives Account established in section 115 of the Legisla-  
23 tive Branch Appropriations Act, 2021 (2 U.S.C. 5513),  
24 \$2,000,000, to remain available until expended: *Provided*,  
25 That disbursement from this account is subject to ap-

1 proval of the Committee on Appropriations of the House  
2 of Representatives: *Provided further*, That funds provided  
3 in this account shall only be used for initiatives rec-  
4 ommended by the Select Committee on Modernization or  
5 approved by the Committee on House Administration.

6 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS  
7 REQUIRING AMOUNTS REMAINING IN MEMBERS' REP-  
8 RESENTATIONAL ALLOWANCES TO BE USED FOR  
9 DEFICIT REDUCTION OR TO REDUCE THE FEDERAL  
10 DEBT

11 SEC. 110. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision  
12 of law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for  
13 “HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—SALARIES AND  
14 EXPENSES—MEMBERS’ REPRESENTATIONAL ALLOW-  
15 ANCES” shall be available only for fiscal year 2022. Any  
16 amount remaining after all payments are made under such  
17 allowances for fiscal year 2022 shall be deposited in the  
18 Treasury and used for deficit reduction (or, if there is no  
19 Federal budget deficit after all such payments have been  
20 made, for reducing the Federal debt, in such manner as  
21 the Secretary of the Treasury considers appropriate).

22 (b) The Committee on House Administration of the  
23 House of Representatives shall have authority to prescribe  
24 regulations to carry out this section.

1 (c) As used in this section, the term “Member of the  
2 House of Representatives” means a Representative in, or  
3 a Delegate or Resident Commissioner to, the Congress.

4 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES

5 SEC. 111. None of the funds made available in this  
6 Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of  
7 the House of Representatives to make any payments from  
8 any Members’ Representational Allowance for the leasing  
9 of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggre-  
10 gate amount that exceeds \$1,000 for the vehicle in any  
11 month.

12 CYBERSECURITY ASSISTANCE FOR HOUSE OF  
13 REPRESENTATIVES

14 SEC. 112. The head of any Federal entity that pro-  
15 vides assistance to the House of Representatives in the  
16 House’s efforts to deter, prevent, mitigate, or remediate  
17 cybersecurity risks to, and incidents involving, the infor-  
18 mation systems of the House shall take all necessary steps  
19 to ensure the constitutional integrity of the separate  
20 branches of the government at all stages of providing the  
21 assistance, including applying minimization procedures to  
22 limit the spread or sharing of privileged House and Mem-  
23 ber information.

1 ALLOWANCES FOR COMPENSATION OF INTERNS IN HOUSE  
2 COMMITTEE OFFICES

3 SEC. 113. (a) ESTABLISHMENT OF ALLOWANCES.—

4 There are established for the House of Representatives the  
5 following allowances:

6 (1) An allowance which shall be available for  
7 the compensation of interns who serve in offices of  
8 a standing, special, or select committee of the House  
9 (other than the Committee on Appropriations).

10 (2) An allowance which shall be available for  
11 the compensation of interns who serve in offices of  
12 the Committee on Appropriations.

13 (b) BENEFIT EXCLUSION.—Section 104(b) of the  
14 House of Representatives Administrative Reform Tech-  
15 nical Corrections Act (2 U.S.C. 5321(b)) shall apply with  
16 respect to an intern who is compensated under an allow-  
17 ance under this section in the same manner as such sec-  
18 tion applies with respect to an intern who is compensated  
19 under the Members' Representational Allowance.

20 (c) DEFINITIONS.—In this section, the term “in-  
21 tern”, with respect to a committee of the House, has the  
22 meaning given such term with respect to a Member of the  
23 House of Representatives in section 104(c)(2) of the  
24 House of Representatives Administrative Reform Tech-  
25 nical Corrections Act (2 U.S.C. 5321(c)(2)).

1 (d) CONFORMING AMENDMENT RELATING TO  
2 TRANSFER OF AMOUNTS.—Section 101(c)(2) of the Leg-  
3 islative Branch Appropriations Act, 1993 (2 U.S.C.  
4 5507(c)(2)) is amended by inserting after “Allowance for  
5 Compensation of Interns in Member Offices,” the fol-  
6 lowing: “Allowance for Compensation of Interns in House  
7 Appropriations Committee Offices, Allowance for Com-  
8 pensation of Interns in House Standing, Special and Se-  
9 lect Committee Offices,”.

10 (e) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There

16 legislative branch of the Government an office to be

## 2 GENERAL PROVISIONS

## 3 MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF PRIVATE VEHICLES

4 SEC. 201. No part of the funds appropriated in this  
5 Act shall be used for the maintenance or care of private  
6 vehicles, except for emergency assistance and cleaning as  
7 may be provided under regulations relating to parking fa-  
8 cilities for the House of Representatives issued by the  
9 Committee on House Administration and for the Senate  
10 issued by the Committee on Rules and Administration.

## 11 FISCAL YEAR LIMITATION

12 SEC. 202. No part of the funds appropriated in this  
13 Act shall remain available for obligation beyond fiscal year  
14 2022 unless expressly so provided in this Act.

## 15 RATES OF COMPENSATION AND DESIGNATION

16 SEC. 203. Whenever in this Act any office or position  
17 not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of  
18 1929 (46 Stat. 32 et seq.) is appropriated for or the rate  
19 of compensation or designation of any office or position  
20 appropriated for is different from that specifically estab-  
21 lished by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-  
22 ignation in this Act shall be the permanent law with re-  
23 spect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act  
24 for the various items of official expenses of Members, offi-  
25 cers, and committees of the Senate and House of Rep-

1 representatives, and clerk hire for Senators and Members of  
2 the House of Representatives shall be the permanent law  
3 with respect thereto.

4 CONSULTING SERVICES

5 SEC. 204. The expenditure of any appropriation  
6 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-  
7 ment contract, under section 3109 of title 5, United States  
8 Code, shall be limited to those contracts where such ex-  
9 penditures are a matter of public record and available for  
10 public inspection, except where otherwise provided under  
11 existing law, or under existing Executive order issued  
12 under existing law.

13 COSTS OF LBFMC

14 SEC. 205. Amounts available for administrative ex-  
15 penses of any legislative branch entity which participates  
16 in the Legislative Branch Financial Managers Council  
17 (LBFMC) established by charter on March 26, 1996, shall  
18 be available to finance an appropriate share of LBFMC  
19 costs as determined by the LBFMC, except that the total  
20 LBFMC costs to be shared among all participating legisla-  
21 tive branch entities (in such allocations among the entities  
22 as the entities may determine) may not exceed \$2,000.

23 LIMITATION ON TRANSFERS

24 SEC. 206. None of the funds made available in this  
25 Act may be transferred to any department, agency, or in-

1 strumentality of the United States Government, except  
2 pursuant to a transfer made by, or transfer authority pro-  
3 vided in, this Act or any other appropriation Act.

4                                   GUIDED TOURS OF THE CAPITOL

5           SEC. 207. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b),  
6 none of the funds made available to the Architect of the  
7 Capitol in this Act may be used to eliminate or restrict  
8 guided tours of the United States Capitol which are led  
9 by employees and interns of offices of Members of Con-  
10 gress and other offices of the House of Representatives  
11 and Senate, unless through regulations as authorized by  
12 section 402(b)(8) of the Capitol Visitor Center Act of  
13 2008 (2 U.S.C. 2242(b)(8)).

14           (b) At the direction of the Capitol Police Board, or  
15 at the direction of the Architect of the Capitol with the  
16 approval of the Capitol Police Board, guided tours of the  
17 United States Capitol which are led by employees and in-  
18 terns described in subsection (a) may be suspended tempo-  
19 rarily or otherwise subject to restriction for security or re-  
20 lated reasons to the same extent as guided tours of the  
21 United States Capitol which are led by the Architect of  
22 the Capitol.

10           PROHIBITION ON CERTAIN OPERATIONAL EXPENSES

11           SEC. 209. (a) None of the funds made available in  
12           this Act may be used to maintain or establish a computer  
13           network unless such network blocks the viewing,  
14           downloading, and exchanging of pornography.

15           (b) Nothing in subsection (a) shall limit the use of  
16           funds necessary for any Federal, State, tribal, or local law  
17           enforcement agency or any other entity carrying out crimi-  
18           nal investigations, prosecution, or adjudication activities  
19           or other official government activities.

20           PLASTIC WASTE REDUCTION

21           SEC. 210. All agencies and offices funded by this divi-  
22           sion that contract with a food service provider or providers  
23           shall confer and coordinate with such food service provider  
24           or providers, in consultation with disability advocacy  
25           groups, to eliminate or reduce plastic waste, including

22                   CAPITOL COMPLEX HEALTH AND SAFETY

23               SEC. 213. In addition to the amounts appropriated  
24               under this Act under the heading “OFFICE OF THE AT-  
25               TENDING PHYSICIAN”, there is hereby appropriated to the



1 Office of the Attending Physician \$5,000,000, to remain  
2 available until expended, for response to COVID–19, in-

5 AUTHORITY TO HIRE INDIVIDUALS COVERED BY THE  
6 DEFERRED ACTION FOR CHILDHOOD ARRIVALS PROGRAM

7 SEC. 214. Notwithstanding any other provision of  
8 law, an entity may use amounts appropriated or otherwise  
9 made available under this Act to pay the compensation  
10 of an officer or employee without regard to the officer’s  
11 or employee’s immigration status if the officer or employee  
12 has been issued an employment authorization document  
13 under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals Pro-  
14 gram of the Secretary of Homeland Security, established  
15 pursuant to the memorandum from the Secretary of  
16 Homeland Security entitled “Exercising Prosecutorial  
17 Discretion with Respect to Individuals Who Came to the  
18 United States as Children”, dated June 15, 2012.

19 This Act may be cited as the “Legislative Branch Ap-  
20 propriations Act, 2022”.
